Note from the Principal

So much has happened in recent weeks, the challenge is knowing where to start in writing this introduction to the last Newsletter of the year.

I am delighted to report that building work on the Refectory has started in earnest. We are getting used to new routes around the school site and the Quad being out of action. It will be worth it! Thank you for your cooperation in not using the Addington Road entrance for the time being. Our new-found Academy status continues to prove very beneficial; we were able to apply to the YPLA – a government funding agency – for capital funds to help us progress our Masterplan for development of the school site. We have now been awarded £890,000 of capital funds to this end. This puts the School in a very good position to take on major projects to improve both Sport and Science facilities in the coming months. The Academy Trust is seriously considering how to proceed even as we speak. I am grateful to Year 10 students who have already been involved in this process, Fraser Drew and Ethan Kenwrick in particular. Watch this space for more developments!

Lastly – numerous congratulations: well done to all our IB candidates who achieved an average points score of 36/45, with Peter Swallow achieving an incredible 44/45; our Chess team lost only to Manchester Grammar School in the National Championship Final held recently at Uppingham School; our Cricket 1st XI has had an outstanding season with 11 wins out of 12, including a stunning victory over the MCC by 9 wickets. Stuart Parsons' double century and Govind Nair's five-wicket haul were notable highlights.

I am sure parents will want to join me in thanking our teachers and support staff for their immense hard work this year. Without their dedication we would not have achieved examination results which led to our award as Best State Secondary School of 2010, as judged by The Sunday Times. More recently, our English Department was judged Outstanding in all categories by Ofsted – an extremely noteworthy accolade. We are lucky indeed to have such a dedicated team.

All in all, an excellent start to the summer and may you all have an enjoyable and well-earned break.

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
School celebrates IB results

This year saw our first group of International Baccalaureate students complete the course and receive their results. We are delighted with their success and their average point score of 36 will undoubtedly place Reading School in the top few schools in the country when the league tables are published in August. Two boys did extremely well with Peter Swallow scoring 44 points out of 45 and Charlie Hayward 41. Peter's result places him in the top 0.6% of candidates around the world and we are all very impressed with his achievement.

The International Baccalaureate is a broad based course covering 6 subjects: 3 at standard level and 3 at Higher level. Students also have to write a 4000 word extended essay; study a module on the Theory of Knowledge and complete and reflect on a variety of extra-curricular activities.

All ten boys who took the course have benefitted tremendously from its academic rigours and are very well prepared for university life. It has not been easy for them to pioneer a new course in a school which has such a strong record of success at A-Level and we are very proud of the way that they have stuck at it and supported each other to achieve this success. Whilst they have many friends within their year, they are, as a group, very close and I certainly hope that the friendships they have forged will survive for many years to come. I personally feel privileged to have been part of their special educational journey and look forward to hearing of their further successes.


CRICKET UPDATE

It has been a particularly successful cricket season for the 1st XI under the management of coach Mr Roca and captain Govind Nair. Eight out of ten completed matches were won, but one in particular will live in the memory for some time.

Has there ever been a more astonishing MCC match? The Marylebone club have a formula for their games, and it is usually successful. They bat first, set a large total, and entice the schoolboys to lose their wickets in chasing their target. Thus, they declared with a score of 299-9, a huge challenge for a school side.

Or so it seemed. Stuart Parsons had had to keep wicket, but went straight out to open the batting, scoring the only double century in the School's history, and finishing not out with 212. We believe that this is only the second double century any schoolboy has scored against the MCC. His young partner, Harry Gannon, kept him company admirably almost to the end. The MCC reverted to more defensive field placing and reintroduced their quicker bowlers, but to no avail. The target of 300 was reached for the loss of only one wicket and with time to spare.

National Schools Chess Championship 2010-2011 Report

The Reading School chess team made the long journey up to Uppingham School, Rutland on Thursday 7th July for the finals of the National Schools Chess Championship, with the team showing their dedication by preparing for the semi-final against RGS Guildford throughout the 3 hour journey.

When the match finally got underway, it was immediately clear that it would be very close as all the boards were very evenly matched. The first positive result came on board 6, with a win for Philip Archer-Lock and this was backed up by draws on boards 3 and 5 for Daniel Noel and Alfred Wong. Unfortunately, Roy Zhang was unable to hold a difficult endgame against a much higher graded player on board 1 but William Foo made up for this by winning a piece on board 2 and expertly converting it to win the ending. This meant that we needed a draw on board 4, the only game still playing, to win the match and progress to the final. After being slightly down earlier on, Robert Starley managed to exchange off into an opposite coloured bishop ending to give us the half point we needed to win $3\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$.

In the other semi-final, Manchester Grammar had made a strong Norwich School team look like beginners, winning 5½-½-½, so we knew they would be very tough. A disappointing loss on board 6 for Philip increased the pressure on the other boards and caused us to press hard for wins in equal positions. Despite this, William was unable to get more than a draw on board 2 but Roy won on board 1 bringing us level on points again. However, it was clear that Alfred was struggling on board 5 where he

was down on material. This meant that we were likely to need a win on board 3 or 4 and knowing this Daniel tried hard in a drawn position only to end up losing instead. Robert only managed to draw on board 4, leaving Alfred with the impossible task of trying to win when 3 pieces down. He duly lost, bringing the final score to 4-2 in Manchester's favour, who won the event for the fifth time.

So a slightly disappointing end but nevertheless finishing 2^{nd} out of 153 schools is still a great result but hopefully we can go one better next year.

All that remains is to thank you to Mrs Readings and Mr Robson for taking us and Mrs Smith, who unfortunately was not able to come with us, for organising everything.


Congratulations to this year's LRC Award winners!

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Formula One boss and OR, Ross Brawn helps student realise dream

Matthew James (9E) has been inspired by the town's close links with motor racing to propose an innovative and exciting partnership with Formula One supremo Ross Brawn.

Matthew James, has a lower arm deficiency which means that his left arm stops at his wrist. His current prosthetic limb allows him to perform only basic 'open and close grip' tasks. Research into a more functional alternative led Matthew to the i-LIMBTM Pulse, which although would give him much more control and freedom, is not generally available through the NHS.

Matthew, a big fan of Formula One, wrote to Reading School Old Boy and Mercedes Team Principal Ross Brawn proposing a unique sponsorship opportunity between the Formula One team and Touch Bionics, the company behind the prosthetic limb. He identified possible synergies in compatible technology used by both companies and particularly impressed Mr Brawn with his "amazingly funny, honest and mature" letter. The Mercedes team have agreed to sponsor Touch Bionics, and in return Matthew will receive his prosthetic arm for free.

Matthew says "Meeting Ross was amazing. I always really admired him as a role model. He obviously went to Reading School, so there's that link". Matthew's father Robert explains what the $i\text{-}LIMB^{\text{TM}}$ Pulse will mean to Matthew. "He always wanted to be the best he can. It's about having the best tool available to allow Matthew to live his life and get on with what he wants to do.

Since his visit, Matthew has been to Silverstone prior to the British Grand Prix for some PR and an update to the story that appeared on the Mercedes GP website. This it to help with the fund-raising efforts for the new bionic limb. Matthew met the drivers, including Michael Schumacher who took a real interest in his story.

Reading School welcomes 100 year old calligrapher Mr Zhao

On 12th July, we welcomed Mr Zhao to the school to give a talk and demo to 20 Year 10 boys. Mr Zhao started his talk with a brief introduction about the bird's calligraphy, which had been in Chinese history for nearly 3000 years. Unfortunately, most of the art work got burned during the Cultural revolution. What makes this style of calligraphy special is that every stroke is like a bird or a worm. Mr Zhao also told the boys a couple of his life stories and encouraged them that learning is a life-long habit. The talk ended with a birthday cake and song singing to celebrate Mr Zhao's 100th birthday. During the session, Mr Zhao wrote 'Reading School' in Chinese for the school to keep. Mr Zhao



was very impressed by our 900 years' history. Thank you to Mrs Hayes for acting as interpreter during Mr Zhao's visit. Mr Zhao is not only a distinguished calligrapher but also quite a legend himself. The Taiwan president has awarded him a few honours and he was treated as a national treasure. Here are some interesting facts about him:



- At the age of 74, he went backpacking in Europe for 5 months without speaking a word of English.
- At the age of 87, in order to encourage his grandson to study for the University Entrance Exam, he also did the exam with his grandson and got into a university to do an art degree.
- In his 90's, he tried to be a charity worker in a hospital but got turned down for being too old.
- At the age of 95, in order to encourage a friend's grandson to study in a graduate school, he also got into a graduate school and finished a masters degree in Art. Apparently, he is the oldest master degree holder and the Guinness Record is in the process of writing him into their book.
- He is currently learning English and how to use a computer. When one of his old colleagues asked him, 'You are about to die, why are you learning computers?', he answered, 'But I am still living'.
