#### **Geography A Level Lectures**

The Geography Department organised for three external speakers to present to sixth form geographers from local schools on specific AS and A2 topics to help them in the run up to their examinations. About 120 pupils attended the three lectures which were supported by the Royal Geographical Society and the Humanities Specialism.

The British Red Cross Disaster Preparedness and Risk Reduction Advisor, Robert Roots discussed the need to help vulnerable populations prepare for disasters to reduce the risks that they face, focusing a year on from the earthquake in Haiti. Dr Clare, a lecturer in Advanced Manufacturing at the University of Nottingham, investigated the rise of the emerging superpower nations and in what ways western

nations can negotiate and maintain their current trading dominance. Peter Durante, a former trader and strategist at Shell, and who now acts as a consultant on energy and environmental issues to industry, government and NGOs worldwide, revealed the current energy dependency of the west and what realistic renewable energy mixes are feasibly and technically available today.

Feedback from Reading School geographers and from other schools was hugely positive with a view to continuing hosting external lectures next year.

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#### Berkshire Book Awards 2010

This term, the Reading School Book Club have been shadowing the Berkshire Book Award, which seeks to find the most popular children's book in Berkshire as voted for by Year 7-9 students across the area.

Particular credit went to Amin Al-Hussainy (8C) and pupil librarian, Soham Bandyopadhyay (10C) for reading all six books on the list, which included Rick Riordan, The Lost Hero, Darren Shan, Birth of a Killer and Jacqueline Wilson, The Longest Whale Song.

The winner this year was Shadow Wave, by Robert Muchamore from his Cherub series. The series - now 14 books long - is about an undercover organisation, which trains children as spies on the assumption that they will not be suspected. Recently, the Reading School LRC published its most popular ten books for issue and Muchamore made up all ten.

Ironically, just like last year, Shadow Wave was the least popular option among the Book Club, who would have preferred Skulduggery Pleasant: Mortal Coil by Derek Landy to win. #### Review of Derek Landy's Skulduggery Pleasant: Mortal Coil

Well, Derek Landy has done it again! Mortal Coil is the fifth book in the Skulduggery Pleasant series and continues his theme of action, adventure, magic and a small twist of humour. After five books, a series usually fizzles out and dies, but kudos to Derek Landy for managing to keep Skulduggery Pleasant fresh and exciting. For those not familiar to the books, they revolve around the characters Stephanie Edgley (a rebellious teenager) and Skulduggery Pleasant (a walking, talking skeleton). Throughout the last four books, Stephanie has been fighting against evil demons to make the world a safer place. But now she must face her greatest enemy: herself. As she realises she is the one who will destroy the world, she franticly tries to stop herself without her partner, Skulduggery, realising what she has found out. Terrified by the thought of him losing faith in her, Stephanie goes to extremes to make sure no-one knows...

Mortal Coil is a brilliant book which enthrals and inspires any who read it. The brilliant addition of a new character (Tessaract) makes the plot even better and, after a bit of conflict (Edward Clennet: "I can't remember any of it so it must have been bad") we all agreed it was a worthy winner.

## **New Reading Station Concourse**

A new Reading Station concourse is being developed alongside Network Rail's multi-million pound upgrade of rail lines into Reading. In order to build the new station which includes a large pedestrianized area, Station Approach – currently used by buses, taxis and cycles – will be closed. This means that roads around the station need to be reconfigured with bus, taxi, cycle, coach and drop off facilities in the area re-organised. Road and bus routes in Reading will change from 18th April and we would like to draw this to the attention of students and parents who use buses that go via the Town Centre. #### National Schools' Chess Championships

On 14th February, the Reading School chess team won their regional zone final to qualify for the last 16 knockout stage of the National Schools Chess Championship. Over the three matches, Roy Zhang, William Foo, Daniel Noel, Robert Starley, Ben Vandersluis, Philip Archer-Lock and Alfred Wong played in the team and all scored at least 50%. The zone consisted of 9 schools from Berkshire, Hampshire and Buckinghamshire who played in a knockout competition.

In the first round, played on 18th January, we were drawn against Yateley Manor who we beat convincingly, 6-0. The next match was much harder, as we were against Eton College who were looking for revenge after we had beaten them both in a friendly and in this competition last year.

theless we played excellently to win 4-2.

This meant that we were through to the zone final, against Wellington College, who offer chess scholarships and have won the National Schools Chess Championship for the last two years. There was no doubt that we were the underdogs - their board 3 was higher graded than our board 1 - but we were the slightly younger team so, due to the age handicap, only needed 3/6 to win. Each game was close and after an hour of play everyone was still playing. Then the first games finished - wins for Philip and Alfred on boards 5 and 6. This meant that we were 2-0 up and only needed one point to win. However, with only 15 minutes of the 2 hours left, we got our first losses on boards 3 and 4, making it 2-2. This left only Roy on board 1 and William on board 2 still playing with very little time left on the clocks. Unfortunately, Roy made a mistake in time trouble to lose a drawn endgame but William played impeccably to win his game when his opponent ran out of time. This meant that the final score was 3-3 so amazingly we won the match and are now through to the national stage of the competition.

Having won our zone, we were against Llandaff Cathedral School from Cardiff in the last 16 of the National Schools Championship. They fielded a very young team, so we needed 4/6 in order to win the match. We started well with a quick victory on board 6 for Philip Archer-Lock. Next to finish was board 4, where, after holding off a strong attack, Robert Starley fought back with a successful counterattack which led to mate. Alfred Wong had been a piece up for a while and converted well on board 5 to give us a 3-0 lead with the top 3 boards still playing, and all in unclear positions.

The decisive game was on board 2, where William Foo had the initiative and played well to win a rook from his attack, giving us the last point we needed. Daniel Noel on board 3 was a pawn down but managed to win a piece to turn the game in his favour, while Roy Zhang played very well on board 1 to draw a very difficult position after his opponent missed a winning move. This meant that the final score was 5.5 – 0.5 to Reading so we are through to the quarter finals, against Dr Challoner's Grammar School.

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#### OR, David Liptrot wins prestigious national award

University of Bath student David Liptrot has won a prestigious national award for significant research he completed during a placement with leading pharmaceutical company AstraZeneca at Charnwood in Leicestershire.

David, who is in his final year of study for a Chemistry degree, was presented with the 'Placement Student of the Year' award by national company RateMyPlacement.co.uk at a presentation ceremony in London.

He impressed judges with work he completed in the medical chemistry department of AstraZeneca Charnwood, conducting synthetic research to improve the access to compounds of potential therapeutic interest.

David said: "Finding new drugs is often very time consuming and can cost a great deal of money. The research I did at AstraZeneca involved looking at very small compounds that make up drugs, and finding ways to improve how quickly and how many of these compounds are created.

"This allows faster and more drug screening, so effectively increases the number of potential drugs that can then be studied and reduces the time taken and the overall cost of producing new medicines."

Steve Roser, senior lecturer and placement officer at the University of Bath, nominated David for the award.

Steve said: "I was very impressed with the commitment David showed to his work at AstraZeneca. Placements are a fantastic way for our students to obtain industry experience and apply the skills they learn during their degree studies. Placement research also gives a number of our students the opportunity to publish a research paper.

"During his time at AstraZeneca, David was involved in four research papers and has a fifth on the way, a remarkable number for an undergraduate student. His research has had a great impact in the Medicinal Chemistry Department at AstraZeneca Charnwood, and

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all those who have worked with him have been very impressed by his achievements."

Bryan Roberts, Senior Research Chemist at AstraZeneca,

who supervised David during his placement said: "David was very enthusiastic and motivated from day one and this has been contagious amongst the research team. He is clearly one of the best students we have had and this is reflected by his level of achievement during his time with us.

"David displays all the key attributes required in conducting successful research and we really hope that he will decide to pursue a scientific career either in academia or industry."

The Department of Chemistry at the University of Bath is recognised for offering strong placement opportunities. David's tutor Mike Hill said: "Our placement scheme is one of the most wide-ranging and long standing schemes in the country. In any one year we send over 60 students on placements and each student is assessed, with the results forming a component of the student's final degree.

"I am a Bath Chemistry alumnus myself and my placement was one of the most worthwhile and significant experiences of my life. I think the same holds for the majority of our current graduates, David included."

David added: "I am thrilled to have won the award for Placement Student of the Year – I chose my degree course based on the reputation of the placement opportunities and feel that spending a year in industry was hugely beneficial to me. I now plan to continue my studies and will begin a PhD next autumn."

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## Year 8 students interview Nick Clegg

It was probably a first - a coalition of students taking on one half of the government's coalition.

In the grand surroundings of the Cabinet Office, Plumstead Manor students in red jumpers joined the dark-blazered boys from Reading School round a table with Nick Clegg. On the agenda was long-term unemployment, the alternative voting system, military action in Libya and changes to secondary education.

The question that brought the loudest laugh came from a persistent Matthew, from Reading School. What should we be doing to contribute to the Big Society and what do you personally do?

> After Mr Clegg appeared to answer the first part, but not the second, Matthew refused to let him off the hook.

> "That's a very good question," Mr Clegg said, before gathering himself and detailing the contribution he makes as Sheffield MP.

> Other personal and probing questions came thick and fast: do you take public transport to work? (no, I have a driver); why, as a smoker, are you proposing moving cigarettes below the counter (my personal habits are not to be recommended); why were your university fees paid for when ours probably won't be (It was the

Conservatives' decision, not the Lib Dems')?

Ali, also from Reading, posed a question Mr Clegg may have already asked himself once or twice: How do I become prime minister?

The advice was "don't pin all your hopes on it - go for it but don't become too obsessed".

Students also learned Mr Clegg favoured English over maths, and would rather listen to classical music than hard rock.

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Climate Week 2011

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As part of Climate Week 2011 a number of key stage 3 geographers took part in the Climate Week Challenge on Monday 21<sup>st</sup> March. This was a national event run in partnership with Tesco and EDF energy and presented the students with the challenge to 'develop a green idea to save money or make money'.

Working in four teams comprising a mix of year 7s, 8s and 9s, the boys came up with four distinct and innovative ideas:

- The Hydro Electric Power (HEP) in Water Pipes Team proposed that with Thames Water already having a network of 31,000 km of piping, the installation of mini turbines in the water pipes themselves would generate electricity by taking advantage of the mains pressure. Team members included James Woolaghan (7E), Tadeusz Ciecierski-Holmes (8S), Ed Clennett (9B) and Jamie Terry (9E)
- The Government Grants for Solar Panels team proposed 100% grants for the installation of roof solar panels to UK residents. The electricity generated would be used by the household and 10% automatically contributed to the national grid. Team members included Philip Tower (7W), Christopher Pegrum (8S), Divyansh Dixit (9A) and Andrew Fisher (9B).
- The Greener Reading Team proposed a branded Greener Reading 'recycled' shop selling green initiatives and energy saving items and would pass their profits onto the creation of a wind farm in Green

Park, the idea was to progress this to other towns and cities. Team members included Harsha Dintakurti (7E), John Perry (8S), Robert Clark (9A), James Messer (7S) and Harry Marshall (9E).

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• The RuBisCO Team proposed a using spray version of the RuBisCO enzyme, which has already be shown to scientifically absorb CO2, on replaceable car and lorry exhaust filters and so target the 22% of the total CO2 emissions that road transport is currently responsible for. Team members included Nikunj Paliwal (7W), Peter Youssef (8C), Henry Irvine (9A) and Stephen Munck (9E).

The presentations that accompanied these ideas were delivered with confidence and each demonstrated a very high level of environmental and scientific understanding. A judging panel comprising the Head of Humanities, the Head of Key Stage 3, the Gifted and Talented Coordinator and the Head of Geography used the Climate Week guideline criteria to score each idea and the result was very close. However, it was decided that the 'HEP in Water Pipes' idea was the winner and this was entered into the national competition for Key Stage 3 students. The way in which the students worked together to develop innovative and feasible ideas was commendable and all that took part in the event should be congratulated.
