As CEO (Chief Executive Officer) of Reading School, I've focused on driving strategic improvements, fostering long-term thinking, and building partnerships that add lasting value to Reading School. We face crucial questions: How can we protect our traditions while embracing bold, future-focused innovations? It is through thoughtful analysis and collaboration that we can position Reading School to not only celebrate our 900th anniversary but look beyond, ensuring sustained success.

Our refreshed mission and vision for 2025-2035 will soon be ratified by the Governing Body, guiding our approach for the next decade. In addition to shaping a future-focused strategy, I'm committed to enhancing our fundraising culture, as evidenced by the generous support of an Old Redingensian (1966-1973) funding our Grand Reunion in July 2025. I'm confident that with this kind of support, we can continue to create meaningful opportunities for our students and alumni alike.

We have secured £36,000 in external funding through the Turing Scheme for our 'Cultural Architects' partnership with a school in Copenhagen. This programme will offer 33 Year 7 students valuable experiences that foster cultural capital and character development. The launch of the Kenwick Sports Pathway (KSP), thanks to key partnerships with Go Perform, Macron, FitLife, and Right to Dream, has also provided 15 students with unique opportunities to excel.



By working closely with external experts such as Dr. Jacob Naish and Professor Alex Hill, and by fostering partnerships with high-performing organisations, we are laying the groundwork for long-term impact. As we move forward, our efforts must be directed towards building sustainable, strategic relationships, locally, nationally, and internationally, that drive social impact and unlock potential.

Thank you all for your dedication to our School. Together, we can ensure Reading School continues to thrive, not only for the next few years but for many decades to come.

Dear Old Redingensians, members of staff, students and everyone in the extended Reading School family...

900 Years of Excellence: Celebrating a Legacy of Achievement at Reading School

It is a tremendous privilege for me to be nominated as your Old Redingensians Association President for the year ahead. We have been blessed to have had Jeremy Chadwick (OR 1979-86) as President for the past two years. Under his tireless energy and leadership, the ORA has gone from strength to strength supporting and enriching the experience of all who are associated with the School.

As Reading School approaches its 900th anniversary, we stand on the cusp of an extraordinary celebration, while reflecting on nearly a millennium of educational excellence, innovation, and tradition. The School's journey is a testament to the enduring values of perseverance and community. From medieval times through to the present day, the School has always been able to adapt to the changing requirements placed on global leaders. Some of whom have walked the corridors can be seen on the 'tea trays' that hang in Big School or on the boards of distinguished service in the Military and Commonwealth. There is a surprising number of books that are published on Old Boys of the School with a history that is both rich and can at times be quite foreign to our

modern lives. I was at School from 1999-2006 during which time there were large changes in the School, from the sale of Bounders Hall, through to the final closing of the West Wing boarding house and even the cessation of Saturday school. I would imagine that the experience I had at School would be quite strange to the current cohort of boys.

While dramatic changes have occurred over the years, the spirit that is imbued at Reading School remains. I have been quite humbled to have discussed some of these points with the current students.

"Where academic excellence was always expected, the importance of the boys becoming good men for future success is even more central to contemporary learning at Reading School."

In recent years this is perhaps most epitomised early during the Ukrainian war where the School, which was oversubscribed, welcomed a cohort of male and female refugees as 'extended guests to the School.' This spirit of inclusivity in adversity, while at times bending rules for the betterment of its students, is something that should be lauded, and this highlights the School's drive to assist those in need.

OLD REDINGENSIS ASSOCIATION

The past year saw the Old Redingensians Association's flagship event, a tour of Guildhall in the City of London, given by Aaron D'Souza (OR 2002-2009), Common Councillor for Tower Ward in the City. The event included a reception, a visit to the Aldermanic council rooms, where the Lord Mayor of London oversees the longest continuously running democracy in the world, which predates the Norman conquest, and a torchlit viewing of the Roman ruins under the streets (as we were unable to locate the light switch!). This event was in support of the Future Stories initiative which aims to assist enrolment into Reading School those from less advantaged backgrounds, to the betterment of all involved with the School.

This continued forward-looking attitude is based on a foundation that has been hard-earned by centuries of former students and the Old Boys that they became. Later in the year the ORA will support the memorial service paying homage to those boys who perished during the wars of the 20th century. Please feel free to come to the Remembrance Sunday Service to be held in the Chapel on the 10 November 2024.

These events help to highlight the strength of the Old Boys network and the spirit of enriching the experiences of members of our community. This is especially important in these times of global uncertainty with potential financial hardship. We are very fortunate to be part of this great history and to be able to assist in the stewardship of the future which is the aim of the Old Redingensians Association. 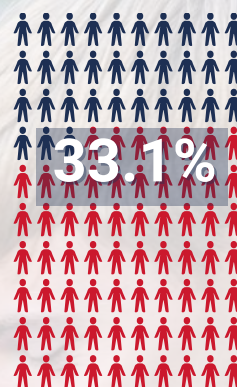

BEYOND READING

This year, two Reading School students are heading abroad for their university studies—one to the USA and the other to Canada. We had the opportunity to chat with them about their exciting journeys ahead.



Abeer M (Class of 2024)



Having completed his A-Levels at Reading School, Abeer M began his exciting journey at the University of Waterloo in Canada. He joined the prestigious Computer Science and Artificial Intelligence (AI) programme, opening doors to new opportunities and advancements in technology.

From a young age, Abeer was fascinated by **coding and software development**. This passion flourished at Reading School, where he excelled in Computer Science, enjoying hands-on projects and the dynamic learning environment. These experiences guided his decision to pursue a degree in **Computer Science and AI**.

"The coding projects and my teachers' encouragement to think creatively were pivotal," Abeer shared. "They inspired me to pursue a career where I could create impactful software."

Abeer's dream of studying abroad began in Year 11, and Canada became his ideal choice for its blend of opportunities and diverse landscapes. A scholarship from the University of Waterloo made this dream a reality and family ties provided support.

Navigating North American university applications was challenging, requiring essays, references and preparation for the SATs. The complexities of the American and Canadian education systems required **careful planning and perseverance**. "The process was daunting but required focus and time management," Abeer admitted.

At the **University of Waterloo**, renowned for its Computer Science program and "Co-op" system, Abeer anticipated gaining practical experience through internships. He looked forward to becoming a well-rounded individual, eager to explore subjects like French and Public Speaking.

His goal is to work as an **AI or Machine Learning Engineer**, developing tools to revolutionise industries like healthcare and education. While excited, Abeer acknowledged the challenges of adapting to a new environment but believed stepping out of his comfort zone would lead to personal growth.

For students considering studying abroad, Abeer offered valuable advice: *"It's a life-changing experience that can offer insights and opportunities you might not find at home."*

He recommended: *"Start early with your applications, engage in extracurricular activities, and build strong relationships with your teachers for references. Most importantly, be open to stepping out of your comfort zone and stay dedicated."*

We wish Abeer continued success on his journey. His story is a testament to the power of pursuing one's passions and embracing new challenges, inspiring others to step out side of their comfort zones.



Isaac B (Class of 2024)



Isaac B, a recent graduate from our school, embarked on his academic journey at Princeton University, where he is studying Computer Science. In a recent interview, Isaac shared some valuable insights and advice for current students as they navigate their school years.

Advice for Students

Isaac emphasised the importance of finding a balance between working hard and enjoying your time at school. *"Try your hardest from the beginning, but don't take it too seriously. It's not that deep until later on,"* he said. He encouraged students to appreciate their younger years, noting that *"they really go by quickly."*

The Importance of Balance

He also stressed the need to avoid extremes, especially during the demanding A Level season. *"A lot of people go too far either way,"* he observed. *"You have to make sure you give yourself time to relax. If you're studying all the time, you're going to burn out."* His advice? Focus on what works best for you and find a healthy rhythm between work and rest.

Overcoming Challenges

Reflecting on his own experiences, Isaac opened up about the personal challenges he faced, particularly anxiety about the future and exam performance.

"I used to worry too much about not getting predicted grades or thinking too much about the future," he admitted. Eventually, he realised that not everything is within our control. ***"The future isn't set in stone, and there's nothing I can do to guarantee a specific outcome. All you can do is try your best and go through it."***

Isaac also took a moment to express his gratitude to one of his teachers, **Mr S Pedlow**. *"I really enjoyed Maths. It interested me enough to pursue it further,"* he shared, hinting at his continued passion for the subject even as he delves deeper into Computer Science.

As Isaac settles into his studies at Princeton, his reflections serve as a reminder to current students to find balance, embrace the challenges and make the most of their time at school.

"Enjoy your time, and make good friends," he advised, leaving us with words that will resonate for years to come.

Similarly making sure each academic society covers the essential information regarding UCAS applications for that subject will ensure that everyone has the best chance for university applications. "I've always been eager to help out wherever I can at school. 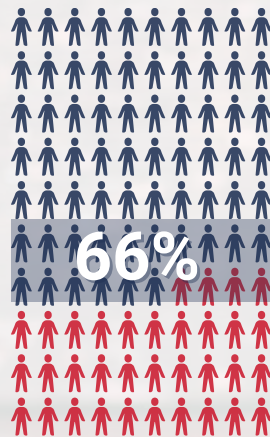

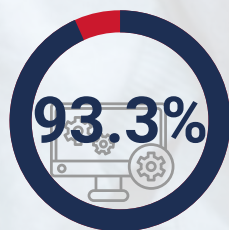

"Crown": Celebrating Diversity and Self-Expression Through Art

Jamie R (12MJK) produced an outstanding piece titled *Crown*, created using fineliner and paint pen on watercolour paper. The artwork celebrates the cultural, racial and ethnic diversity of our school community by highlighting the unique hairstyles and headdresses Jamie sees every day. These represent not only individual styles but also broader cultural identities, reflecting the beauty and significance of self-expression through hair.

Jamie described the piece as an evolution of his earlier work, which explored the beauty of Black hair and was inspired by artist **Gerrel AK Saunders**. This new piece shifts focus to the diverse styles present within our own school. The fracturing of the hair in the artwork reveals a tapestry of



box braids, cornrows, mid-tapers, curly hair, straight hair, waves, durags and Sikh patkas. The gold accents emphasise the beauty and importance of hair as a form of self-expression.

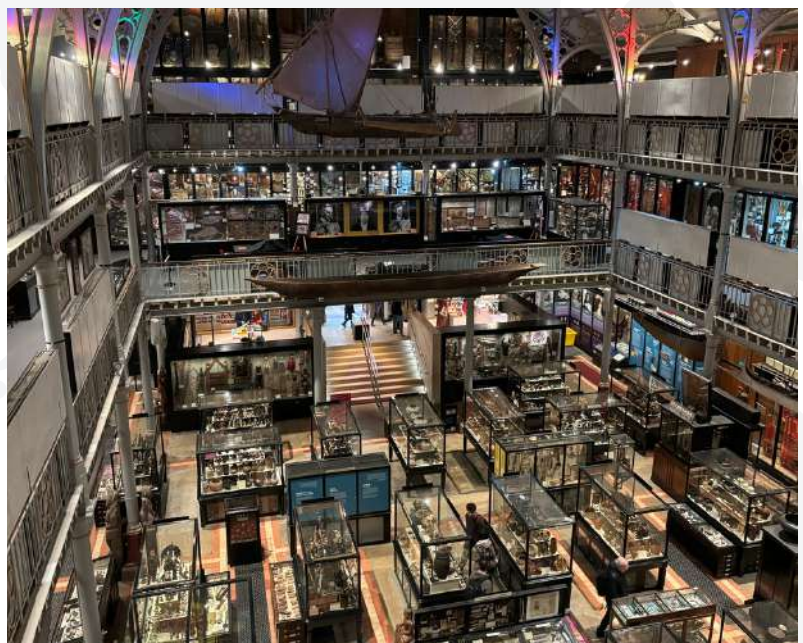
Artistic Adventures Beyond the Classroom

These trips allowed students to deepen their understanding of art and photography, both in and beyond the classroom.



BIOLOGY



Success at Royal Society of Biology Competitions

Our students across various year groups excelled in the **Royal Society of Biology's** competitions this year, showcasing their remarkable talent and dedication.

For the **Intermediate Biology Olympiad**, Year 12 students secured 3 Gold, 13 Silver and 11 Bronze awards from over 14,000 participants across 709 schools. Their achievements highlight their deep understanding and enthusiasm for biology.

In the **Biology Challenge**, Year 9 and 10 students achieved an impressive tally with 43 Gold, 70 Silver and 66 Bronze awards. Out of 45,400 students from 621 schools worldwide, our biologists performed exceptionally well in this online competition consisting of two 25-minute multiple-choice papers.

British Biology Olympiad

In the **British Biology Olympiad**, which saw participation from over 10,000 students across 700 schools, our Year 13 students achieved impressive results: 6 Gold, 10 Silver and 9 Bronze medals.

Following subsequent selection rounds, **Nikolaos A (13MK)** stood out as one of the top sixteen performers and was chosen as one of the top four to represent the UK at the **2024 International Biology Olympiad in Astana, Kazakhstan**. There, Nikolaos and his teammates demonstrated their skills in molecular biology, animal anatomy and practical tasks, with Nikolaos earning a Bronze medal.

Nikolaos shared, *"I am beyond delighted to have had a chance to not only compete in the IBO, but also to receive a medal for the UK team. It was a once in a lifetime opportunity to visit a unique country and to meet countless like-minded people. I am extremely grateful for Reading School's guidance, and the training they facilitated for the team and me as my IBO participation would not have been possible without the school's help."*

CHEMISTRY



RSC Chemistry Olympiad 2024



The Royal Society of Chemistry (RSC) Chemistry Olympiad 2024 is a prestigious competition that challenges students to excel in chemistry, testing their problem-solving skills and creativity through complex real-world scenarios. Our students achieved remarkable results, securing 5 Gold, 6 Silver and 1 Bronze awards.

Special recognition goes to **Azaan A (13DAW), Maulik A (13FEH), Isaac B (13LDO), James B (13SP), Advay C (13MK), Jiewen G (13E), Alessandro M (13FEH), Rohan N (13FEH), James R (13ELA), Ben S-R (13LDO), Tom S-R (13DAW) and Vivek S (13ZMC)** for their outstanding achievements in this challenging competition. Their success not only reflects their hard work and dedication but also highlights the high level of chemistry education and enthusiasm at Reading School.

RSC Schools' Analyst Challenge

Fifteen of our Year 12 students participated in the **RSC Schools' Analyst Challenge**, competing in teams of three alongside 15 students from **Kendrick School**, accompanied by their **Head of Chemistry, Dr Joshi**. The winning team included **Ryan Liu, Paarth Goswami and Maninder Singh**.

This competition allows Year 12 students in England, Wales and Northern Ireland, as well as S5 students in Scotland and 5th Year students in the Republic of Ireland, to demonstrate and expand their chemistry knowledge and analytical skills through practical experiments addressing real-world societal and industrial issues.



National Scientific Thinking Challenge

In 2023-2024, all of our Year 10 students participated in the **National Scientific Thinking Challenge**, an innovative competition designed to assess critical thinking and analytical skills rather than rote memorization of taught material.

Students were tasked with analysing data, graphs and text to make deductions, identify trends, formulate hypotheses and spot anomalous results.

We are proud to announce that our students achieved an impressive total of **63 gold, 33 silver and 22 bronze awards**. Congratulations to all participants for their remarkable achievements!



Cambridge Chemistry Challenge



Forty-two of our Year 12 chemistry students participated in the **Cambridge Chemistry Challenge**, showcasing their passion and skills in the subject.

The competition aims to challenge students interested in chemistry and provides an excellent experience for those considering further studies. Designed by an experienced team of teachers and university chemists, it is accessible to Year 12 students while pushing them beyond the syllabus and fostering a university-level approach to scientific thinking.

Our students excelled in this competition, achieving impressive results: **10 earned Gold awards, 12 received Silver and 13 secured Copper awards**.

Regional Victory in 'Top of the Bench' Chemistry Competition

Ms K Rosser-Evans, Teacher of Chemistry, led a team of four students to the **University of Oxford** for the regional heats, competing against 16 other schools. The competition included practical tasks, written theory tests and team challenges to assess safety, problem-solving and chemistry knowledge.

The team secured first place in their regional heat, earning the **Phil Smith Trophy** and certificates for their outstanding performance. They advanced to the **national final** in **Edinburgh** in March, representing one of 32 qualifying schools. Although they did not place, they performed exceptionally well and were incredible representatives of the school, competing in both practical tasks and a written exam.

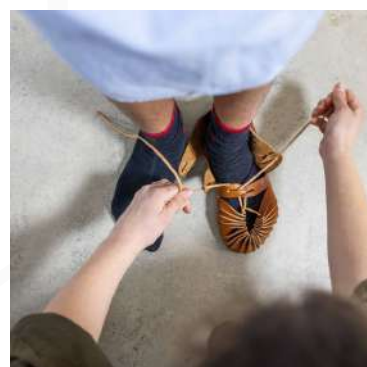


Experience Roman Life at the University of Reading

COMPUTER SCIENCE

UK Space Design Competition 2024

In early November 2023, 12 Sixth Form students participated in the **UK Space Design Competition** at **Oxford Brookes University**. Led by **Mr Z McAllister, Head of Computer Science**, they joined students from other schools to form an engineering company tasked with designing a crewed space settlement within our solar system.



The event gave students hands-on experience in tackling real-world challenges in space exploration. Working together, they applied their academic knowledge to address complex problems like logistics, resource management and the technical demands of living in space.

Prabhav B (12W) said, *"The UK Space Design competition was thoroughly enjoyable, and a first of a kind experience for me to practically apply a lot of the knowledge I've gained in all my STEM subjects over the years. Working with other students with similar interests and skills to deliver a large project was very satisfying, albeit more challenging than I expected! I'd totally do it again next year, hopefully winning with the experience I've gathered from this year."*

Placement Day Experience at Microsoft

We encourage our students to seek work experience opportunities to broaden their horizons and explore their interests. **Alan T (11W)** gained valuable insights into the technology sector through his placement at **Microsoft's** Thames Valley Business Park on the Inset day in February 2024.



Alan also learned about the software development cycle, including the 'discovery' phase where project specifics are detailed and initial solutions are drafted. He noted the advantages of the agile methodology, which allows for flexibility and incorporates past project learnings, compared to the older 'waterfall' method.

Alan's placement not only broadened his knowledge of industry practices but also gave him a glimpse into potential career paths in technology, showcasing the practical applications of classroom learning in a real-world context.

Alan T (11W) shared, *"Spending time at the Microsoft office with my family friend was an incredible experience. I was introduced to a data science team, consisting of a Project Manager, Solutions Architects, Consultants and Coders. I also saw how Microsoft's AI, Copilot, supports employees by creating presentations and answering document-related questions. This visit gave me valuable insight into the technology industry."*

Their performance showcased their language skills and provided them with invaluable experience in Hispanic theatre, as they competed for the best performance award among a diverse range of creative works.

ECONOMICS

Institute of Economic Affairs' Budget Challenge

Our Year 12 team, consisting of **Achinthya R (12SA)**, **Nathan W (12JTE)**, **Ranjeev S (12ZMC)** and **San C (12DAW)** participated in the **Institute of Economic Affairs (IEA) Budget Challenge**, a national competition for Economics student, and achieved an impressive second place.

The competition began with the team submitting an essay analysing the current macroeconomic conditions and proposing a UK budget with detailed tax and revenue plans. Their essay earned them a spot in the semi-finals at **The Vinson Centre**, where they presented their policies to a panel of economists.

Their strong performance in the semi-finals advanced them to the finals at the IEA Headquarters. Despite a closely contested final, the team achieved a commendable second place. The challenge provided a valuable experience, allowing the students to apply their A Level knowledge to real-world policymaking and broaden their understanding beyond the classroom.



Stock Market Challenge

Four Year 12 economists—**Aarush V (12ELA)**, **Jago K (12DAW)**, **Shan S (12ZMC)** and **Shlok K (12VGG)** represented Reading School at the **University of Reading's annual Stock Market Challenge** in July. This event allowed Year 12 students to explore stock market dynamics in a simulated trading environment.

Aarush described the experience as "*incredibly fun*" noting how it effectively simulated the life of a trader. He explained, "*We learned to rapidly analyse economic events and make quick decisions to secure a profit. The challenge sharpened our negotiation skills as we bought and sold stocks in a competitive, fast-paced setting.*"

Shlok highlighted the importance of timing, stating, "*The market fluctuated rapidly, so making timely decisions was crucial. The challenge was both intense and rewarding, and I would encourage others to participate next year for a similar experience.*"

Poet Laureate for 2023-2024 - Edward Y (9W)

Following a tradition dating back to 1668, the **Poet Laureate** position celebrates poetic excellence and national occasions.

Who take them as their Voice.*



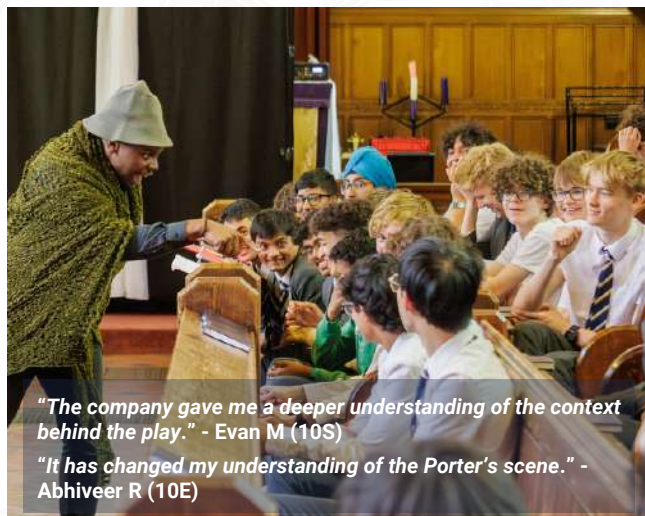
GCSE English Literature - Shakespeare's Macbeth Comes Alive

We welcomed the return of the touring company **The Globe Players** with their riveting production of **Shakespeare's Macbeth**.

Students experienced the play's powerful themes of drama, humour, terror and morality, enhanced by live performance. Through narration and analysis interspersed with the action, **The Globe Players** brought **Lady Macbeth's** infamous line, "Look like the innocent flower, But be the serpent under't", vividly to life. The engaging performance deepened students' understanding and appreciation of Shakespeare's classics beyond the pages of their texts.

2023 Reading Foundation Mcllroy Essay Competition

James T (12RC) won the annual **Mcllroy Essay Competition 2023**. His winning essay, titled *"How Writing Makes Life Better"* captured the judges' attention with its inspirational message and exceptional clarity. Selected anonymously by a panel of Reading School staff, James' essay stood out for its powerful exploration of how writing connects people and shapes our lives.



Reflecting on his participation, **James T (12RC)** shared, *"The competition reminds us of the impact that words can have – how they connect with others, evoke emotion, and provoke thought. The ability to articulate ideas effectively is an essential skill."*

He also emphasised that the competition isn't just for those pursuing English qualifications: *"Whether your interests lie in STEM or the Humanities, this competition offers the opportunity to experiment beyond mark schemes and push past the curriculum."*

House Eisteddfod 2024

House Eisteddfod celebrates our students' passion for reading and writing, engaging the entire Reading School community in the arts. This annual competition features two elements: presentations of non-fiction and fiction texts (speeches, prose, poetry, drama) and creative writing, all based on themes chosen by each House.

The student-led event is organised by House prefects and involves as many participants as possible. Students in Years 7, 8, 9, 10 and 12 also take part as the audience, watching the presentations live in the Chapel. **School House** won this year's overall competition, with Laud, East County and West following.

GEOGRAPHY

Geography Teachers' Conference 2024

The first-ever **Geography Teachers' Conference**, hosted at Reading School, was led by **Head of Geography, Dr K Young**.

Keynote speaker **Professor Nigel Arnell** from the **University of Reading** delivered the keynote lecture on the theme of climate change. **Professor Arnell** shared his insights about the impacts and consequences of climate change on different scales and explored how we can use scenarios and stories to inspire optimism when talking about climate change.

We shared our gratitude with **Reading Blue Coat School, Wilson's School, Wilmington Grammar School, The Oratory School, Sir William Borlase's Grammar School** and **Queen Anne's School** in Caversham.



Geographical Innovation Challenge 2024



Four teams from **Reading School** and **Kendrick School** participated in the **Geographical Innovation Challenge 2024**, focusing on solutions to the issue of microplastics.

Each team presented proposals to reduce or remove microplastics from the environment, demonstrating a strong understanding of their origins, pathways and potential solutions. They covered funding, scalability, modifications, stakeholder interests and limitations.

Judges assessed the creativity and feasibility of each approach, highlighting the students' ability to address real-world environmental challenges with innovative ideas. We are proud of their commitment to tackling one of today's critical ecological issues.

Azores Adventure: Year 10 and 12 Geographers Explore Natural Wonders

In April, Year 10 and 12 students embarked on an exciting educational trip to the **Azores**. The adventure began with a scenic hike around **Furnas Lake**, where students explored fumaroles and learned about volcanic activity. They also visited the stunning **Terra Nostra Botanical Gardens** and toured the **Gorreana Tea Plantation**.

The journey continued with a trek through the **Renewable Energy Forest**, where students learned about hydroelectric power, followed by a dip in the thermal pools of **Caldeira Velha**. Another highlight was visiting the **Lagoa do Fogo** crater lake and savoring the sweetness of pineapples at the **Arruda Plantation**. The final day took the group to **Sete Cidades**, offering spectacular views from the King's viewpoint.

This trip was an enriching experience, blending hands-on learning with the exploration of the Azores' unique geography.



HISTORY

Reviving History: Educational Trips and Future Adventures

It's been a great year for History at **Reading School**, with students engaging in new ways as we prepare for our 900th anniversary. We have evolved our curriculum with new modules on the **Mughal Empire**, **Pandemics**, and electives on **Warfare** and **American Civil Rights**, making history even more engaging for students and teachers alike.

Year 12 students have also engaged with history beyond the classroom. **Milan G** and **James T** participated in the **Historical Association's Great Debate**, delivering speeches on **Reading Abbey** and **former Headmaster Richard Valpy**. Additionally, **James T** took part in the Lessons from **Auschwitz project** together with **Ben H**, later sharing their experiences with our Year 8 students.

We are grateful for our partnership with the **Historical Association**, which brings outstanding historians to our lecture theatre six times a year. This year, we have learned about Labour governments, the **Polish-Lithuanian**

Commonwealth and prophecy in the **War of the Roses**. Next year's schedule includes talks on video games, life in the East India Company, and Jeeves and Wooster, with all students, parents and alumni welcome to attend.

In 2023-2024, we have undertaken a number of educational visits. For instance, Year 11 students visited London to learn about **Elizabeth I**, Year 7 students took a historical tour of Reading, and Year 12 students attended the **Chalke Valley History Festival**.

In 2024-2025, we are expanding our educational visits with trips planned to **Vietnam** (Year 12) and **Berlin** (Year 10), with more possibilities to be announced.

As we move into our anniversary year, the importance of history has never been more evident and we look forward to continuing to explore and engage with the past in new and exciting ways.



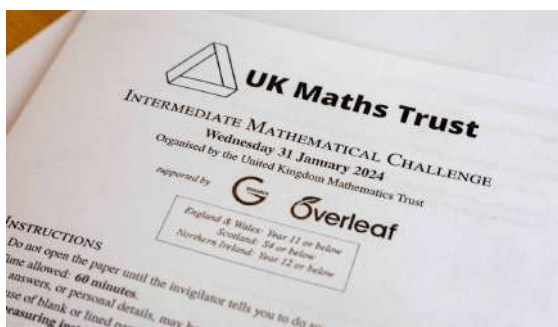

MATHEMATICS



The UKMT Junior Mathematics Challenge

At Reading School, every student in Years 7 to 10 participates annually in the **Junior, Intermediate and Senior Maths Challenges**. These challenges provide our students with an opportunity to apply their mathematical skills and tackle advanced problem-solving questions.



In 2023-2024, **Rukul N (11S)** earned an invitation to the prestigious **National Mathematics Summer School (NMSS)**. Held in Leeds, the week-long residential course brought together top mathematics students from across the country, offering them a chance to engage in mathematical thinking and connect with like-minded peers.

National Cipher Challenge Success

Organised by the **University of Southampton** and sponsored by **IBM, GCHQ, Trinity College, University of Cambridge, UKRO,** and **The Institute of Mathematics**, the **National Cipher Challenge** is in its 22nd year. This year, **Luke H (13BSA)** was awarded the **Trinity College, Cambridge prize** for being one of the fastest soloists to complete the final challenge.

Luke's achievement not only showcased his talent but also served as an inspiration to his peers and younger students. He plans to write a book to encourage others in codebreaking, reflecting his commitment to the school's values—'*learn, lead and serve.*'



Luke H (13BSA) stated,

"I've tried the challenge every year for three years, and while I have been able to complete every cipher in the first nine weeks within the first point boundary, the last cipher was always a hurdle for me. Two years ago, I solved it in 10 days, and last year it took me 20 days. However, this year, armed with better knowledge regarding ciphers, and more data, I was able to identify the type of cipher and develop a tool that allowed me to solve it within 2 hours. During the event, I was presented with my gold medal and certificate from Trinity College, University of Cambridge."

MODERN FOREIGN LANGUAGES

The MFL Tournament Cup 2024

In May, Reading School hosted a three-way **Modern Foreign Languages Football Tournament** between France, Germany and Spain. Sixth formers competed for the coveted **Reading School Language Cup** in a unique 6-a-side football game where all communication, including refereeing, was conducted in French, German or Spanish.

Organised by **Mme E Fondu, Head of Modern Languages**, and **Mr M Cooper, Head of Classics**, the competition included team talks in the respective languages and penalties for using English. "Golden cards" allowed teams to make changes, like adding players, only if called out in the correct language. The event combined physical activity with linguistic challenges, showcasing enthusiasm from players and supporters alike.



Festive Celebrations and Learning Opportunities

Throughout the year, our school embraced the festive spirit of both **Christmas** and **Lunar New Year** by creating engaging opportunities for students to explore and celebrate different cultures.

These special days not only brought festive cheer but also offered students unique chances to learn and practice new skills in an enjoyable and interactive way. From immersing themselves in traditional German crafts and cuisine during the Weihnachtsmarkt to participating in enriching Chinese New Year activities such as calligraphy and lion dancing, our students gained hands-on experiences that deepened their cultural understanding and enhanced their learning in a fun and memorable manner.



Enriching Modern Foreign Language Trips



This year, our students enjoyed a range of enriching language trips that extended their learning beyond the classroom. **The Spanish Exchange** took Years 10-13 to **Albacete, Spain**, where students engaged in local school lessons and gained work experience in a primary school.

In France, our long-standing exchange with **Lycée Jean Guéhenno in Fougères** allowed Year 12 and 10 students to experience British and French cultures firsthand. They participated in local visits and work experiences while hosting their French partners at Reading School.

Our Year 9 **Mandarin Excellence Programme** took students to **China**, where they explored traditional arts, visited **Guangzhou Zoo** and engaged in cultural activities like papercutting and calligraphy.

These trips provided valuable real-world experiences, enhancing language skills and broadening horizons.

Exploring the Mysteries of the European Organisation for Nuclear Research (CERN)

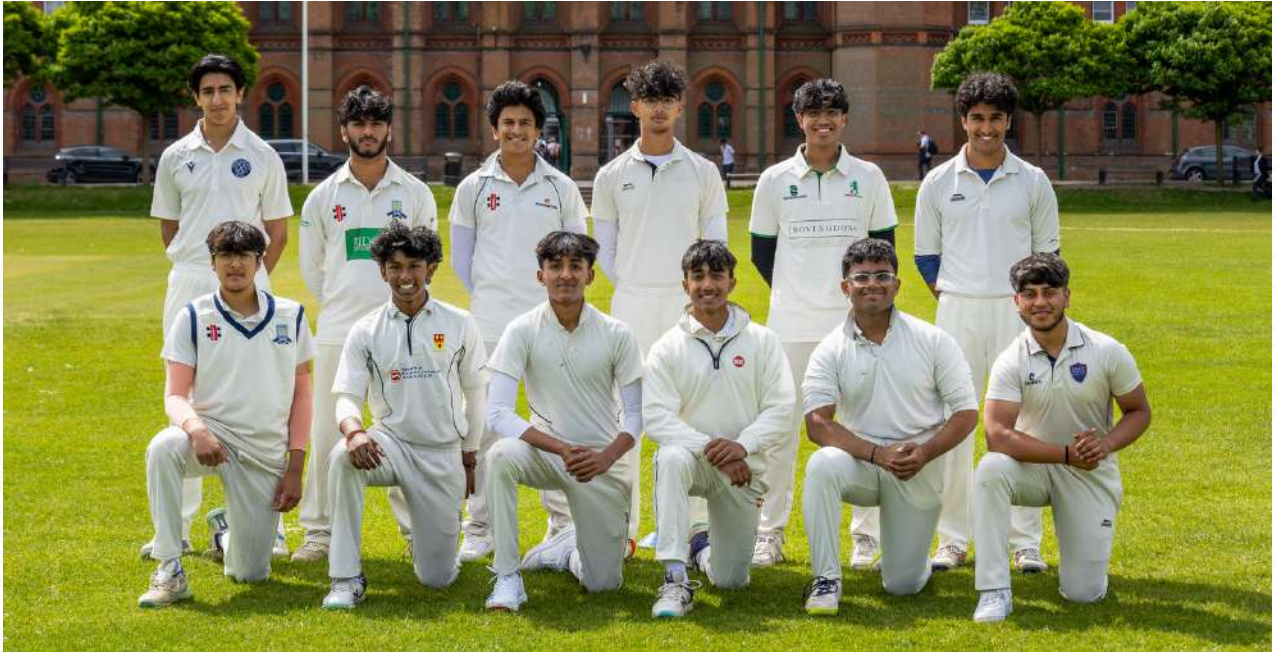

At CERN, students toured the massive ATLAS detector and the cryogenic facility, witnessing the advanced technology behind particle acceleration. The highlight was a lab workshop where they created their own cloud chambers, visualising subatomic particle trails.

Reading School's sports program has thrived this year, with a wide range of sports and competitions, both at local and national levels. Here's an overview of achievements and activities across various sports.

Rugby

With over 45 fixtures, Reading School's rugby teams competed in the Reading Schools league and County Cups/Festivals, fielding 180 players. Four of our students were selected to represent Berkshire, a testament to their skill and dedication.

Football

Cricket

Athletics

Our athletics program fields three teams (Years 7, 8, and a combined Year 9/10 team) across eight matches. Several students were selected for the Berkshire team, and three achieved GB representation. Sports Day 2024 saw the entire school compete at Palmer Park, showcasing our athletic talent.

- Rugby Tour - Senior players attended a pre-season four-day training camp in Swansea.
- Cricket Tour - Scheduled for February 2025, our cricket team will embark on an exciting tour to Cape Town.

Additional Sports and Achievements

This year, Reading School expanded its offerings with new and impressive performances across several sports. Ultimate Frisbee gained popularity, with 30 students training and competing in a National Tournament. Hockey saw our Junior and Senior teams enter two competitions, highlighting growing interest in the sport. Our Swimming team debuted in September, marking an exciting new addition to our athletic roster. In Powerlifting, **Rajan D** (Year 13 leaver) became the U18 Regional Record Holder after starting his strength and conditioning training in our PE curriculum, using the **Huggins Suite**. Judo was another standout sport, with **George R** (Year 13) selected for the England National Squad, showcasing exceptional skill.

Academic PE Results

Our academic achievements in Physical Education were equally outstanding. **A-Level PE** students achieved a remarkable **100% A*-A** rate, while **GCSE PE** students earned a **100% 7+** grade. Interest in the subject continues to grow, with more students choosing to pursue PE at both levels. These results reflect not only student dedication but also the high quality of our academic PE program.

House Competitions

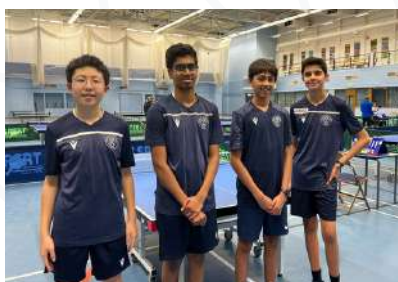

Social Enterprise Hub Project

The Social Enterprise Hub Project, established in 2022 through a partnership between **The Abbey, Henley Business School** and **Reading School**, offers sixth form students the opportunity to develop social enterprises under the guidance and support of entrepreneurs and lecturers from **Henley Business School**. The initiative guides students in creating ventures that address social or environmental issues in the local community.

Over an 8-month period, participants engaged in practical entrepreneurship experiences through workshops led by **Dr Amal Ahmadi** of **Henley Business School** and **Charles Lovibond** of **The Abbey**. These sessions covered business establishment, financial planning and pitching for funding, featuring insights from experts such as **Jurek Sikorski**, **Director of the Henley Enterprise Lab**, **Anna De Amicis**, **Lecturer in Management and Media** and numerous external speakers.

In May, students presented their social enterprise ideas to a panel of judges made up of staff members from **The Abbey, Henley Business School** and **Reading School**. Teams received feedback from the panel to help strengthen their ideas.

Due to the high quality of presentations, a record number of teams secured provisional funding to advance their projects. We extend our gratitude to all participants for their dedication.



James T (12RC), whose team received a £1,000 for their enterprise 'mindFULL', said:

"The Social Enterprise Project has provided a fantastic opportunity for cross-school collaboration, and for all students involved to actively participate in planning to advance positive social change in our local area. FRANK TERRY MEMORIAL LECTURE

Dr Stefan Fafinski DL (OR1978-1985)

We were honoured to welcome **Stefan Fafinski DL (OR 1978–1985)** back to Reading School as our guest speaker for the **Frank Terry Memorial Lecture 2023**.

After attending Reading School, Dr Fafinski went on to study Natural Sciences (Physics and Theoretical Physics) at **St John's College, Cambridge** and spent the first 15 years of his career in the IT industry. He later pursued a law degree as a mature student, which led him to complete a Ph.D. in technology law at the **University of Leeds**. He currently serves as a **Chair of the Parole Board for England and Wales**, a **Thames Valley Family Magistrate** and a **Deputy Lieutenant for Berkshire**, assisting the **Lord Lieutenant** in representing **HM The King** in the County.



Dr Fafinski delivered an insightful talk on the vital role of the Parole Board within the criminal justice system of England and Wales, providing students with valuable perspectives on this important topic. He offered an overview of the Parole Board's operations and its impact on the lives of offenders to students from Reading School, The Abbey School and Kendrick School. His presentation shed light on the complexities of parole decisions and their broader implications.

This Annual Lecture honours the legacy of **Frank Terry**, a respected History Teacher and Boarding Headmaster who served Reading School from 1946 to 1982.

His talk inspired students to explore careers in geography and engineering, sparking curiosity and encouraging future exploration.

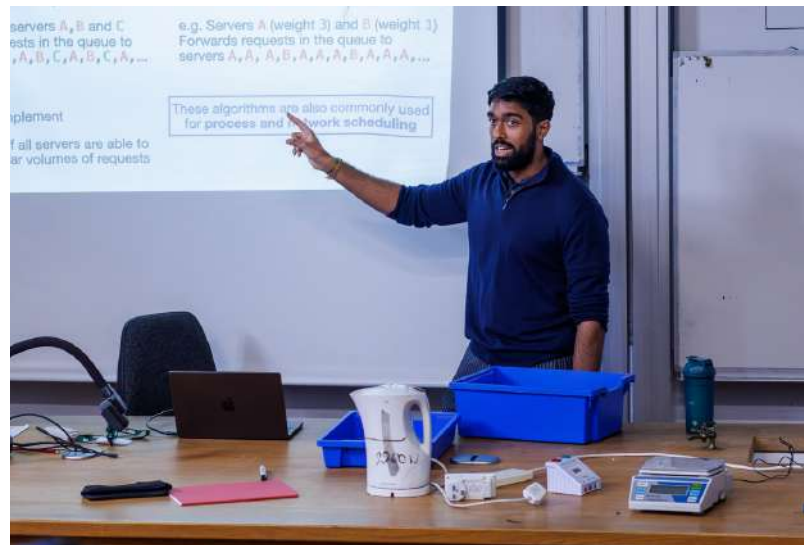


Exploring the World of Distributed Systems

Royal Air Squadron Trophy Competition

We spoke with **Mr T Evans, Assistant Head and Belonging Week Lead:**

In your own words, how would you describe Belonging Week?

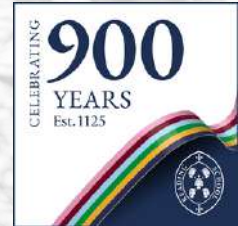

FUTURE STORIES

Partnerships are vital to secondary education and extend beyond the classroom. By building strong connections with schools, organisations, parents, businesses and the community, we enhance our educational offerings and support our mission. These partnerships help us achieve our goals, define our identity and foster an inclusive and dynamic environment where both students and the community can thrive.

Now in its 9th year, **Future Stories** continues to grow, delivering structured and meaningful programmes. During the 2023-2024 academic year, the Future Stories initiative has positively impacted **over 1,500 children** across **more than 15 local primary schools** through various on-site and off-site activities, offering inspirational opportunities for children and young people.



After-school Mentoring Sessions

The after-school mentoring sessions provided targeted support in Maths and English for Year 5 pupils from local primary schools. Over 30 students participated, working one-on-one with Year 12 mentors to strengthen their understanding of key concepts.



Weekly Maths Mentoring

Weekly Maths mentoring sessions were led by Year 12 students for pupils from **English Martyrs' Catholic Primary, Katesgrove Primary, Geoffrey Field Junior, Battle Primary Academy, Whitley Park Primary and Moorlands Primary**. These sessions, held both on-site and online, aimed to enhance pupils' Maths skills through interactive problem-solving.

On the other hand, Year 11 mentors conducted character education and Maths mentoring sessions for pupils from **St Mary and All Saints Church of England Primary School**. The sessions included activities such as cooking and team-building, followed by focused Maths support.



Indoor Rowing and Multi-Sports

Year 11 mentors led indoor rowing coaching sessions for **over 1,000 pupils** from 10 local schools. Additionally, multi-sport sessions were arranged for pupils in Years 3-6 from **English Martyrs' Catholic Primary School**, offering a diverse range of physical activities.

Community Rowing Programme

With a background in Theology from **Oxford University**, James is deeply committed to fostering community ties through rowing. To further promote the sport of rowing, we also held an **Indoor Rowing Competition** at the school, encouraging more students to get involved and experience the excitement of the sport.

Q & A

WITH JAMES STEPHENSON

We had an interview with Revd James Stephenson, who spearheaded the Reading School Community Rowing Programme.



Can you tell us about your background and what brought you to Reading School?

My journey began in middle-distance running, but a back injury led me to switch to rowing, which became a spiritual and contemplative pursuit. I joined the GB Rowing Team, but a severe back injury before the 2008 Olympics was a setback. I later bounced back, winning a gold medal in triathlon in 2011. After retiring from sports, I pursued ordination and worked on social impact projects in Zambia and New Zealand. Returning to the UK, I now focus on initiatives like the rowing programme at Reading School, where I help create meaningful experiences for students.

How does rowing contribute to a child's development, and what message would you give about its value for young people?

Rowing goes beyond physical skills, it builds grit, perseverance and a growth mindset. It instills values and resilience, teaching young people to overcome challenges and strive for excellence. The passion and perseverance developed through rowing make it a valuable addition to any young person's personal growth and can be applied to all areas of life.

I have observed a strong student-centric approach at Reading School, which is rare and commendable. The focus on student needs over ego-centric leadership creates an environment where students can truly thrive. It's a testament to effective leadership and a supportive educational culture.

Our Flagship 'Futures Stories' Social Mobility Programme for Pupil Premium and Looked After or Previously Looked After Children, is now in its ninth successful year and has been shortlisted in the 'School/College of the Year' category as finalists for the third year running.

The main objectives of the Future Stories programme are:

- 1. To develop the leadership skills, capacity and capability of students currently at Reading School, by working in partnership with state primary schools.***
- 2. To raise aspirations and widen access to Reading School for children from disadvantaged backgrounds.***

Our target is to substantially increase the number of pupil premium pupils and looked after pupils who apply to take our entrance test. In order to gain admittance to Reading School all children must achieve the qualifying score to be eligible for entry.

We deeply value the contributions of our departing teachers and associate staff, whose dedication and passion have left a lasting impact on both our students and the school community. Throughout their tenure, they played a crucial role in shaping the minds and futures of countless students. To honour their legacy, we conducted interviews with some of them, reflecting on their experiences, insights and the memories they have created at Reading School.



Interview with Ian Sharma

Can you share a bit about your career journey?

I've been a Physics teacher for 42 years, starting my career at St Crispin's School in Wokingham in 1982. The excitement of receiving my first job offer unexpectedly was a memorable moment. Over the years, I've had the privilege of teaching and impacting students' lives, especially during my rewarding tenure at Reading School, where I've been part of a dynamic educational community.

What were your first impressions of Reading School when you visited in September 1986?

When I first visited Reading School on a Saturday morning in September 1986, I was struck by the welcoming atmosphere and the sense of tradition. I had an informal chat with the Head of Physics, John Barraclough, who was a true gentleman. The Staff Common Room felt like an exclusive club, and my discussions with Brian Turnbull, Headmaster John Bristow and Deputy Headmaster John Haynes gave me a strong sense of the school's community and values. What started as a casual visit turned into an informal interview, leading to my role as a Physics teacher.

How did the physical environment of Reading School in 1986 compare to what it is today?

In 1986, Reading School was quite different from how it is now. At that time, the West Wing boarding was in use, and there were no John Kendrick Building, Page Building or Refectory. The Junior School served as the dining area, where we enjoyed meals while admiring the murals of The Miraculous Catch of Fish. The evolution of the physical space over the years has been remarkable, reflecting the school's growth and modernisation.

What does Teaching mean to you?

Teaching is in my blood. I enjoy delivering my subject in a way that excites people, especially through practical Physics experiments. I find joy in using the practical kit and demonstrating it to others. Interacting with students and hearing their feedback is rewarding. For example, David Grindle (OR 1973-1980), whom I taught to A level, visited and shared how he and his friends often discuss my impact on his life. Knowing you've made a lasting impression is deeply satisfying and highlights the true reward of teaching.

What's been your proudest achievement?

I'm proud that Tom Whipple (OR 1993-2000), once my student, became a Science Correspondent for The Times. His book, *Get Ahead in...Physics*, features my name in the acknowledgments, what a thrill! I'm also delighted by the three students who reached the international Astrophysics Olympiad team.



Interview with Kees Luteijn

What makes working at Reading School different?

The student body is exceptional, but what truly sets Reading School apart is its strong values and how they're embedded in everything. Staff are encouraged to participate beyond teaching. I've taken students canoeing, cooked in electives and joined trips to Finland. The school is outward-looking, actively engaging with the wider community and international partners, ensuring students aren't just exam-focused.

What are the benefits of the 'Reading Way' for students?

It's not just about grades; it's about using their talents to make a broader impact. The 'Reading Way' encourages students to embrace challenges, collaborate, and grow into well-rounded individuals.

What's been your proudest achievement at Reading School?

Our work supporting refugees and connecting our students with young people from different backgrounds has been incredibly meaningful. It helps our students, who are often privileged, understand others' experiences.

How would you sum up your time at Reading School?

It's been incredibly rewarding. Beyond academic achievements, it's the moments of building relationships with students that stand out. Seeing their curiosity and having the freedom to go beyond the standard curriculum has been a highlight.

What's next for you?

I'll be joining Leighton Park as Director of their International Baccalaureate programme, eager to bring what I've learned here to a new challenge.



Interview with Owen Thomas

Can you tell us about your background in teaching?

I started by teaching English and Maths in Thailand. Feeling I needed more training, I returned to the UK, got my teaching degree and eventually found my way to Reading School.

What's unique about Reading School?

The sense of community is strong. Students are competitive but often in helping each other. There's a broad range of talents. I've had students miss lessons to compete in international badminton or robotics finals.

What's your proudest achievement at Reading School?

Starting the Future Stories Science Week for local primary schools. It's rare for secondary schools to offer their lab facilities and it's been fulfilling to see this project thrive.

What's next for you?

I see myself teaching a bit longer, perhaps becoming a Head of Science, and I'd like to start on the textbook I've always wanted to write.



Interview with Ben Miller

How long have you been at Reading School, and how did you find yourself here?

I've been here for four years. Before this, I worked at the University of Birmingham's Jubilee Centre for Character and Virtues, researching character development. Reading School felt like a perfect fit for implementing these ideas.

How have you embedded character education at Reading School?

Character education focuses on who students become, beyond academic results. At Reading School, values like integrity, kindness and service are central. We blend theory and practice, encouraging students to be brave, honest and try new things, whether it's paddle boarding, debating or admitting mistakes. This creates a culture where students can develop holistically, not just academically.



Interview with Alison Jackson

What inspired you to join Reading School?

I started as a Library Assistant in June 2011, looking to stay active once my sons were in school. I initially supported school trips and led the Heritage Walk before a permanent role opened, and I seized the opportunity to join the Reading School community.

How has Reading School evolved during your time here?

In 13 years, I've seen many changes, like new buildings, the addition of the Refectory and the shift from four double lessons to a more dynamic daily schedule.

What message would you have for anyone doubting character education?

Focusing solely on grades is limiting. Academic success thrives in an environment where students are mindful of their character. It's not just about becoming successful professionals but doing so with moral integrity and a sense of societal contribution. Character and academic excellence should coexist and be intentional.

Have you achieved your vision for the school?

It's an ongoing journey. Character education doesn't end with school, it's something we all develop throughout life. Our goal is for students to be reflective and community-minded, though we may never fully see the impact. Hopefully, their future actions will reflect the values we've instilled.

Where does your journey take you next?

I'm moving to Warwick School as Assistant Head for Character and Community, eager to bring my Reading School experiences to a new setting.

What are your most memorable experiences at Reading School?

*A highlight was the 2018 battlefields trip to Belgium, where my husband and I researched cemeteries of Reading School alumni and laid crosses on their graves. Accompanying two alumni to lay a wreath at the Menin Gate and witnessing *The Last Post* was deeply moving. I also cherish the annual history walk for Year 7s during Belonging Week, especially exploring the original school site at St Laurence's churchyard. During COVID, connecting with elderly Old Redingensians and hearing their memories was another standout experience.*

Any acknowledgments or final reflections?

I'm grateful for my involvement in meaningful projects and exploring the school's rich history. A special thanks to Ken Brown, the Old Redingensian Association's Archivist, for his support with my historical research.

With an Economist, a Physicist and a Doctor round the table, this re-union was remarkable for the skills and career paths represented and for its resemblance to the Class of 2024!



The principal difference, of course, is Rick's sixty years of computing and consulting, which included remarkable and historical roles, such as involvement in the **Singer Sewing Machine** company's doomed attempt to break into computing and **Walgreen's** first attempt at a US-wide database.

All were invited to the 900th anniversary alumni gathering to be held on **Saturday 12th July 2025**, and we eagerly await catching up with one another again.

Spanning just over a decade in the life of the school, a defining feature over dinner was the joy of remembering the incredible service of teachers such as, **Ned Holt, Brian Turnbull, Mervyn Jackson, Tom Ashworth, Dick Owen, John Vaughn, Margaret MacDonald, Bob Lewis, George Pfeiffer** and **Tom Walter**.

Highly successful in their own fields, but not having had many opportunities to reconnect with the school since they left more than 30 years ago, Nick, Jeremy, Ian and Gareth each had significant reflections on the way the school had shaped their lives.

Nick and Jeremy had particular affection for their time in West Wing as boarders, and all shared insights into the significance of the character formation and academic discourse they experienced as students. John Vaughan and Tom Walter's influence as teachers was particularly interesting. 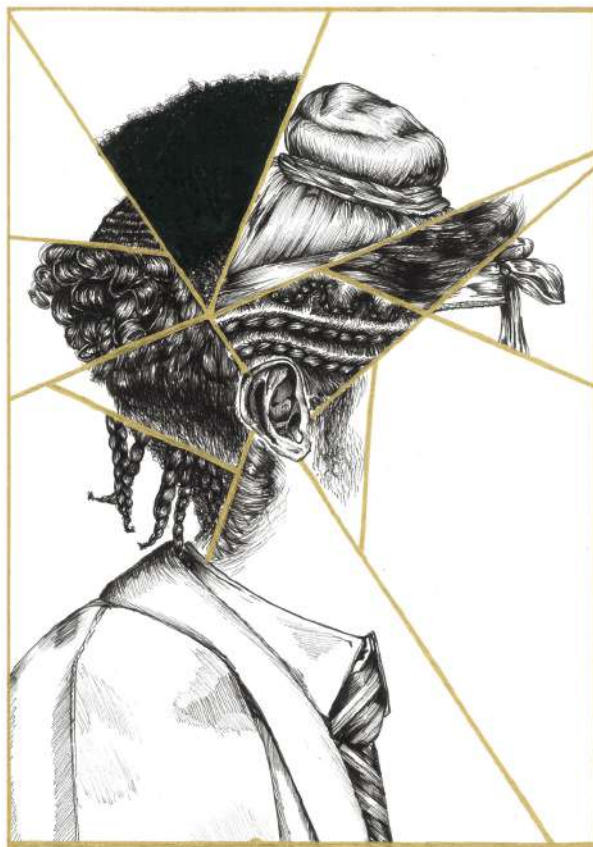

WASHINGTON STATE - BELLINGHAM

Bellingham, 50 miles south of Vancouver and 80 miles north of Seattle, is home to two of Reading School's most remarkable alumni, and was a stunning backdrop for the Headmaster's fifth US alumni meeting.

Professor Jim Talbot (OR 1943-1951) must be one of the most energetic 91-year-olds on the planet. Having joined Reading School from Alfred Sutton at the encouragement of a relative, he read **Geology** at **Jesus College, University of Cambridge**, before leading a long and distinguished academic career.

A former Provost, Curriculum Committee chair and University Vice President, Jim is full of good cheer. With an inspirational educational philosophy, he described his approach to teaching as *"Always trying to make sure my lectures got at least one laugh per hour, because learning has to be engaging if it is to stick."*

Jim provided commentary on the rock formations of the Bellingham Bay and San Juan islands as he and the Headmaster were taken for a morning cruise in **Dr Peter Coggan (OR 1962-1964)**'s beautiful power catamaran. Peter (School Captain in the Class of 1962) with his partner **Maureen**, has retired to Bellingham, after an equally prestigious academic journey.

Formerly **Associate Dean for Graduate Medical Education** reporting to the Dean of **Michigan State University's Medical School**, Peter has spent his considerable academic skills improving public health in struggling communities, practicing family medicine, implementing better ways of recruiting and examining medical students, and supporting strategic philanthropic endeavours.

He has graciously provided funding for one of the school's new rowing boats, which will be named **Invictus** after the famous poem by **William Earnest Henley**. This poem meant a great deal to Peter, whose father died whilst he was school captain, and whose mother passed away just four years later.

Peter received much support in his grief from the long-term benefactor of the school, **Alfred Edgar Milward**, whose considerable kindness to the school is summarised here, by Ken Brown, a friend and contemporary of Peter's and whose example Dr Coggan has undoubtedly imitated most admirably throughout his life.

After six days of flying, the Headmaster was privileged to spend a whole day with Peter and Maureen, absorbing their wisdom and reflecting on Peter's memories of the School. Peter played every sport possible and remembered with great fondness the co-curricular provision in the school, which set it apart from the county grammar school he studied in until the age of 15.

Dr Coggan provided much counsel to Dr Evans, encouraging the school to use the 900th anniversary to build relationships and to develop a strategy with **The Reading Foundation** and the **Old Redingensians Association**, which might help the school's friends and partners to combine their influence and resources in aid of the school's mission.

We hope this journey has already begun – after all, it was only through the connections of the Old Redingensians Archivist, **Ken Brown** and in response to the Headmaster's visit that Peter and Jim got to meet for the first time.

Peter requested that the school set up a 'legacy society' and volunteered to be its first committed giver and a principal advocate. He also suggested a range of initiatives he would like to sponsor, and provided some outstanding suggestions to develop the school's connections with old boys.

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

Ken Mills (OR 1942-1947)

In an interview with Ken Mills (OR 1942-1947), Ken shared his journey from his academics during the war at Reading School demonstrating resilience and providing inspiration to his career in finance and extensive travel to 73 countries.

*"I am **Ken Mills**. I got a scholarship to Reading School, coming from Battle Junior School in West Reading, which placed me in West House when I joined. My time at Reading School was from 1942 to 1947. For those five years, it was wartime, and even after the war ended, things were still pretty bleak. Life was rationed and austere, very different from what you'd see in schools today, and some of you might find it hard to believe the conditions we managed through," Ken Mills recalls, his voice full of memory and warmth.*

Ken's journey to Reading School began each day with a trolley-bus ride through Reading, followed by a walk up Elgar Road. *"At just under eleven years old, I'd see the older boys, especially the prefects, and think they were giants! I was pretty short back then."*



He remembers being from a modest family, his father sacrificed significantly to allow him to attend grammar school on a scholarship. *"We had very little. My mother had a stroke when I was only eight, which left her paralyzed on one side. A dear family friend, who I called Auntie Eunice, came in and took care of us. She was a wonderful woman, she drove a car, played the piano and organ, cooked and sewed. I'm sure my parents and Auntie Eunice were so proud of me for getting into Reading School. They didn't show it openly in those days, but I think they were."*

Life in Reading during the war was a mix of simplicity and resilience. Ken recalls an unforgettable day when a bomb dropped on the town.

"I was at school doing extra PT, and suddenly we heard an explosion. A German aircraft dropped a bomb on its way home. It landed in central Reading, hitting a restaurant called 'The People's Pantry', where you didn't need to use ration books. Several people lost their lives there. I remember walking through Reading afterward, through all the broken glass near Heelas."

Daily life had its challenges, but Ken also remembers the simplicity fondly.

Ken Mills (OR 1942-1947) continued

"We didn't have phones or computers, and couldn't go to the seaside because the beaches were mined to prevent invasion. But we found happiness in simple things. We played games, we just got on with life, and somehow, it was still a happy time, despite the war."

At Reading School, students practiced air raid evacuations to shelters on the field. At home, his family had an Anderson shelter in the garden—a small corrugated iron hut covered in soil.

"When the alarm sounded, we'd go down to the shelter and wait for the all-clear, which sometimes didn't come. But my father had a good sense of when we were safe."

Ken's memories of wartime in Reading paint a picture of a close-knit community.

"We could play in the streets without any worry. Girls would skip in the side streets, and boys played football, not worrying about traffic. Food deliveries like milk and bread were often by horse and cart. The street lamps near our house were gas-powered, and I remember the lamplighter who'd come around at dusk and dawn with a long pole to turn the lights on and off."

Ken chuckles as he recalls a familiar call that rang through the streets:

"A man with a flat cap would walk along, calling out, 'Muffins and crumpets!' I remember those well."

Ken's recollections reflect a time when life was simpler, but full of resilience, family pride and joy in small pleasures. His journey from **Battle Junior School to Reading School** highlights the enduring spirit of those years and the lifelong connections forged in the halls of Reading School.

We were delighted to capture not just the spirit of his school days but also a life filled with adventure, dedication and fond memories! Ken's stories bring out the warmth, humour and learning of those times. The tale of selling horse manure, early jobs, his school routines and escapades (like the carbide ink prank) gives a lively picture of the discipline and mischievous energy that must have been present.

The journey from those early days at school, through working at the bank, joining the Sea Scouts, to meeting his beloved late wife, Rosemary and then exploring the world together, speaks to a life lived with curiosity, commitment and a deep appreciation for adventure and companionship. It's clear that the values from Reading School and the respect for learning shaped him into someone who not only took pride in his work but found purpose in helping others manage challenging moments, especially in his banking career and beyond.

We particularly loved the Rhine cruise chair scene and the beautiful tribute to an enduring love story, first sparked by a toffee paper! And experiencing 73 countries, including places like Nepal, Peru, and the Galapagos— creating incredible memories.

Ken Mills (OR 1942-1947) continued

Ken's legacy is a profound reminder of the values we hope every Reading School student carries forward. Reflecting on his journey, he shared these messages with us, which we are honoured to pass on.

Ken's first message is simple but is about **building character**:

"If given the opportunity—travel."

Ken's second message centres on living a **life of purpose** and **connection**:

"Life is about more than promotions or acquiring all the things you want. Real fulfilment comes from caring for others, cherishing time with family, and living each day with joy. We're all mortal, and we don't know what tomorrow holds. So, do good, find enjoyment in each day, and look forward to the future with a sense of hope and positivity."

Ken's final message speaks to **gratitude** and **generosity**:

"I began my life in poverty, and through hard work and fortune, I've been able to share my blessings. I've chosen to leave a significant portion of my estate to charities, including Reading School. The school has given me so much, and I want to give back, as a gesture of gratitude and encouragement to others. I believe anyone who attended Reading School would feel it shaped them positively. I hope all alumni consider leaving something for the school and other causes dear to them. Giving back, sharing not just knowledge but values - this is how we make a meaningful impact on others."

AN EMINENT OR – BULKELEY BANDINEL DD

Who was this recipient of a 'Tea Tray' in Big School with the sonorous, faintly Dickensian name?

The Bandinel family have a distinguished and aristocratic background, claiming a Pope and six Cardinals in their family tree. David Bandinel settled in Jersey and became a naturalised British subject in 1602.

Bulkeley Bandinel *pictured right* was David's three times great grandson. David's great great grandson, James, came up to **Jesus College, Oxford** from **St Saviour on Jersey** and in 1758 was appointed a Fellow of the College. He married **Margaret Dumaresque** in 1775 and they settled in Oxford. There followed five children of whom Bulkeley was the third. He was born in Oxford on 21



February 1781 and named for his father's friend, **Viscount Bulkeley of Cashel**. Bulkeley was educated at **Reading School** (under the Headmastership of **Dr Richard Valpy**, from another noted Jersey family) **Winchester and New College, Oxford**.



Through Bulkeley there is an (extremely!) tenuous connection to **Admiral Lord Nelson** as Bulkeley served as Chaplain on HMS Victory in the Baltic from 1808 with **Admiral Sir James Saumarez** before becoming under Librarian of **the Bodleian Library** in 1810 frontage *pictured left*.

The Librarian was his godfather **John Price** and he succeeded him three years later. Bulkeley's impact was immediate and acquisitions rocketed. Many important manuscripts and books were acquired and his long tenure as Keeper of **Bodley's Library** was marked by continuous expansion of the collections and many spectacular purchases. A small part of the interior of the Library is *pictured right*.





During his fifty years working in the Library he re-catalogued the printed books, a task taking many years and resulting, in 1843, in the definitive form which is still used today.

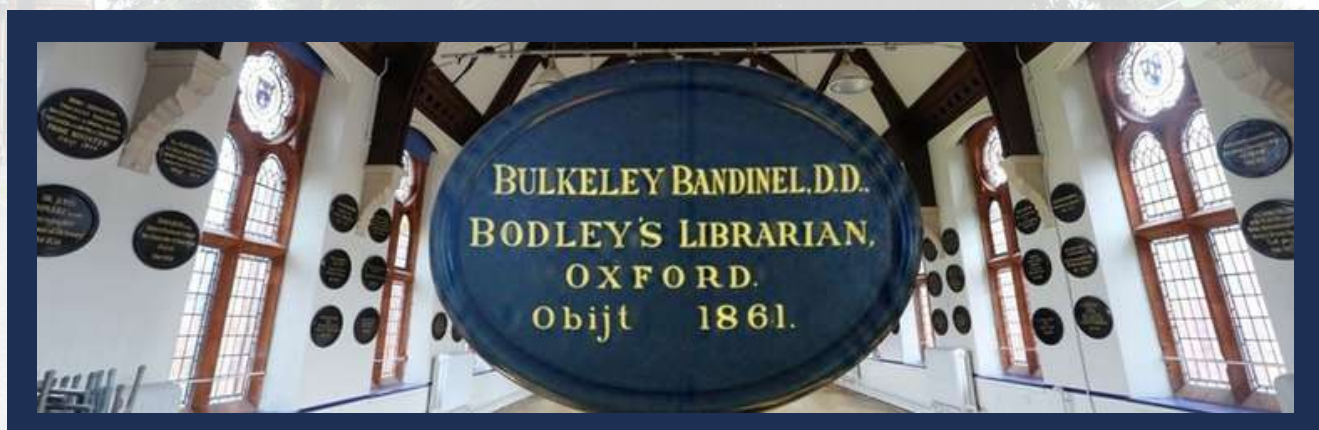
In 1860 he resigned his post, old age and infirmity having become too challenging. He retired on his full salary and was appointed an honorary curator but only had months to enjoy his new status, dying at 31 Beaumont Street on the 6 February, 1861, at the age of 79, from angina after a severe attack of bronchitis.

He was a delegate of the **University Press** from 1813. In 1814 Bandinel was also **Dean of New College**, and **Proctor for the University** earning great credit in that post. He was a prolific author and editor.

He married **Mary Phillips** in 1815 at **Sutton Courtenay** but there were no children of the marriage. She died in 1875 and lies beside him in a family grave, *right*, in St Sepulchre's Cemetery of St Mary Magdalen, Oxford..



By most accounts he was a courteous and kindly man – when it suited the purpose of the Library. But he was also evidently autocratic and did not suffer fools gladly. His subordinates did not have an easy time but he was a very great figure in the history of Sir Thomas Bodley's library.

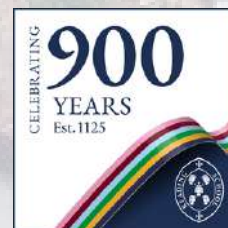

Lindsay Mullaney Henry I and his Abbey

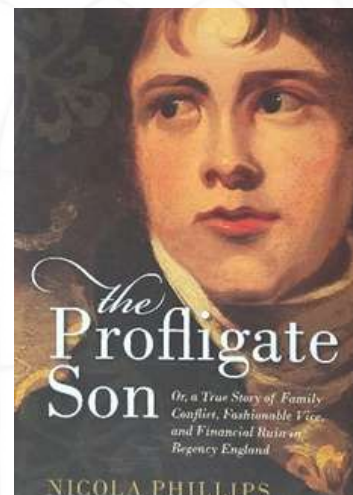
