An award-winning Roman history podcast by Matt Smith, Rhiannon Evans and Caillan Davenport. *Emperors of Rome* is a podcast about the Roman world — its power structures, cultural life, and the people who lived inside one of history's most influential empires.
Rome was more than emperors and battles. It was poetry recited at dinner parties, monuments built to shape memory, laws that organised daily life, and stories Romans told about who they were and why they mattered. - **Mythos** - available in the LRC [part of a series]:
Mythos by Stephen Fry is a witty, highly engaging retelling of classic Greek mythology. Blending ancient tales with a modern, conversational voice, it covers the creation of the universe, the rise of the Olympian gods, and their dramatic, often absurd, interactions with early mortals.
- **Heroes** - available in the LRC [part of a series]:
In *Heroes*, Stephen Fry retells the thrilling, tragic, and timeless tales of eight legendary ancient Greek heroes. This action-packed companion to *Mythos* blends myth with Fry's signature wit, following mortals like Jason on the Argo, Atalanta, Oedipus, and Heracles as they battle monsters and outwit scheming gods.
- **Troy** - available in the LRC [part of a series]:
The epic blends history and myth, following legendary heroes (like Achilles and Odysseus) and meddling gods through a masterclass of romance, betrayal, violence, and the ultimate deception: the wooden horse.
- **Odyssey** - available in the LRC [part of a series]:
In *Odyssey*, Stephen Fry concludes his bestselling Greek myths series by tackling the epic homecoming of Odysseus after the Trojan War. Blending thrilling adventure, dark humor, and his signature witty prose, Fry chronicles the hero's perilous 10-year journey across monster-filled seas back to his clever wife, Penelope.
- **The Silence of the Girls** by Pat Barker - available in the LRC:

The Silence of the Girls is a gritty, feminist retelling of Homer's *The Iliad*. Narrated by Briseis, a captured Trojan queen, it strips away the romanticized glory of the Trojan War to expose the brutal realities faced by enslaved women in the Greek camp.

- Circe by Madeline Miller - available in the LRC:
Circe is a brilliant feminist retelling of Greek mythology. Banished by Zeus to a remote island for practicing dark witchcraft, the outcast goddess discovers her own strength, taming beasts, crossing paths with legendary heroes, and ultimately defying both gods and the Fates to forge her own destiny.
- The Song of Achilles by Madeline Miller - available in the LRC:
It is a captivating and devastating retelling of the Trojan War. Told from the perspective of Patroclus, it traces the deep, enduring romantic bond between him and the legendary warrior Achilles, set against a backdrop of gods, kings, and tragic destiny.
- King of Ithaca by Glyn Ilfie - available in the LRC [part of a series]:
It is the first installment in the *Adventures of Odysseus* historical fiction series. It follows Eperitus, an exiled soldier who saves Prince Odysseus of Ithaca. The pair team up to save Ithaca from rebellion and join the quest to woo Helen of Sparta, setting the stage for the Trojan War.
- Argo by Mark Knowles - available in the LRC:
An action-filled retelling of the famous Greek myth, Jason and the Golden Fleece.
- Lore by Alexandra Bracken - available in the LRC:
This is a Greek mythology-meets-*Hunger Games* fantasy where nine gods are made mortal every seven years and hunted by descendants of ancient bloodlines. To survive, the protagonist Lore Perseus is dragged into a deadly game of revenge and divine power struggles.
- Rome: The Emperor's Spy by MC Scott - available in the LRC [part of a series]:
This is an action-packed historical thriller set in AD 54. It follows Sebastos Pantera—a Roman assassin and spy—who must stop a radical religious sect from fulfilling an ancient prophecy that Rome will burn, all while dealing with Emperor Nero's ruthless schemes.
- Under the Eagle by Simon Scarrow - available in the LRC [part of a series]:
This is the thrilling first novel in the Eagles of the Empire series. Set in 42 AD, it follows the unlikely bond between battle-hardened Centurion Macro and well-educated new recruit Cato as they navigate brutal military campaigns, barbarian territories, and a deadly imperial conspiracy.
- Imperium by Robert Harris - available in the LRC [part of a series]:
This is the first novel in the acclaimed *Cicero Trilogy*. It is a gripping historical thriller narrated by Cicero's confidential secretary, Tiro. It follows ambitious lawyer Marcus Tullius Cicero as he battles the corrupt Roman elite and attempts to attain supreme political power in the violent, treacherous world of the Roman Republic.
- Persian Fire by Tom Holland - available in the LRC:
This is a gripping historical account of the Greco-Persian Wars. It explores how the mighty Persian Empire invaded Greece in the 5th century BC, and how the rebellious city-states of Athens and Sparta managed to hold out, shaping the trajectory of Western civilization.
- The Silver Pigs: The Falco detective series by Lindsey Davis - almost certainly in your local library:
In Ancient Rome (AD 70), a cynical but sharp-witted private "informer" named Marcus Didius Falco rescues a young woman on the run. He is quickly dragged into a deadly conspiracy involving stolen imperial silver ingots, corrupt politicians, and an aristocratic senator's daughter.
- Ariadne by Jennifer Saint - available in the LRC:
This is a feminist retelling of the Greek myth of Theseus and the Minotaur. It tells the classic story from the perspectives of Princess Ariadne and her sister Phaedra, exploring the heavy toll that the selfish ambitions of men and the whims of volatile gods take on the women of Crete

Accessing resources from the LRC

Using the LRC Before Reading Week

- All pupils can borrow books from the LRC for Reading Week.

E-Resources Available From Home 24/7 The LRC subscribes to a range of high quality e-resources that can be accessed from home. Both platforms can be accessed using pupil Office 365 logins:

VLeBooks is a small ebook library and provides access to both fiction and non-fiction ebooks. Books can be read online. You can access VLeBooks via this link www.vlebooks.com. This includes 6th form wider reader titles. You can also preview books we do not own.

ePlatform by Wheeler's is our new ebook and audiobook platform found here: <https://readingschool.eplatform.co>

The ePlatform library catalogue is full of bestselling, popular fiction titles. Students can have 2 books out on loan at any one time, and they will automatically return after 2 weeks, or students can return them early in order to loan a new book. The eBooks can be read on a computer, laptop, or through the free App on your tablets or smartphones.

Reading through your web browser on a laptop or computer

Students can browse the collection or search for a specific book title, author or publisher and loan the book they choose. It is then assigned to them for the 2-week period.

Reading through the App

To download the App, search "ePlatform" in the App store and download. Click on the app and you will then need to search for the library which will be **Reading School**. Once you start typing, it will bring up the school on the list. Click the 3 little lines in the top left corner and select sign in. Using the App, the books will be temporarily downloaded to the device so students will not need internet connections once the book has been loaned to read, great for travelling!
