**Admission to Year 12 in September 2020**

### Frequently Asked Questions



<b>Q</b>	<b>What is the minimum points score requirement for Reading School for entry in September 2020?</b>
A	The minimum points score for entry into Reading School in September 2020 is 56 points from your top 8 GCSE (or 54 points if you are Pupil Premium/Looked After or Previously Looked After). Meeting or exceeding the qualifying score only means that the candidate <b>may</b> be offered a place at Reading School because, if the number of applicants exceeds the Admission Number for 2020 the oversubscription criteria will be applied. <b>Q</b>	<b>How do I apply for the Sixth Form?</b>
A	All Internal and External students are asked to complete the online application form which can be found at the following link: <a href="https://www.reading-school-admissions.co.uk/">https://www.reading-school-admissions.co.uk/</a> . The online application process commences on 1 <sup>st</sup> December 2019 and closes on Friday 31 <sup>st</sup> January 2020.
<b>Q</b>	<b>How many external applicants were admitted in 2019?</b>
A	A total of 70 external students were admitted in 2019.
<b>Q</b>	<b>Did every applicant (internal and external) get to study their preferred option choices?</b>
A	Where possible we will accommodate as many option choices as possible. However, not all applicants will be able to study their first choice subjects due to some subjects being oversubscribed. If a subject is oversubscribed and all sets are at full capacity, students with the lowest predicted grades may be asked to choose an alternative subject or take up their reserve choice.
<b>Q</b>	<b>Can I change my option choices?</b>
A	After offers have been made, any requests to change subject into a department that is oversubscribed will be put on hold until GCSE results are published. At this point a combination of the best 8 GCSE point scores and the mark achieved in the relevant subject will be used to determine ranking.
<b>Q</b>	<b>The option blocks appear to have every subject available to select. How does this work?</b>
A	Option blocks are in place to optimise the number of students who are able to study their preferred combination of subjects. We will therefore look at all option choices after the deadline of 31 <sup>st</sup> January and work on our blocks to accommodate as many selections as possible. However, the option blocks are anticipated to be as per page 9 of the Sixth Form Information Booklet.
<b>Q</b>	<b>Do I have to take a test or be interviewed as part of the admissions process?</b>
A	No tests or interviews will take place as part of the admissions process. Once offers of places have gone out, all students who receive a conditional offer will be invited to a consultation meeting to discuss subject options, career pathways and extra-curricular interests. The purpose of these appointments is to make transition into the Sixth Form as easy as possible. In addition, all successful applicants will be expected to attend the sixth form registration day. For internal students this will be on Thursday 20 <sup>th</sup> August and for external students on Friday 21 <sup>st</sup> August 2020 to confirm subject choices, to sign a sixth form agreement and to confirm GCSE results.
<b>Q</b>	<b>My son currently lives and studies overseas and is not taking GCSEs. What do I need to do?</b>
A	For entry into the Sixth Form, students must have achieved the equivalent of a total of at least 56 points from 8 GCSE subjects (54 points for students who are Pupil Premium/Looked After or Previously Looked After) and at least a grade 5 at GCSE in Maths and English Language or a DfE recognised equivalency. For students studying other exam boards we ask you to contact NARIC direct at: <a href="http://www.naric.org.uk">www.naric.org.uk</a> . NARIC may be able to convert grades for alternative qualifications into a GCSE equivalent. All NARIC statements will need to be emailed to the admissions department at Reading School.
<b>Q</b>	<b>Why do students wishing to study Chemistry, Economics or Physics need a minimum of 60 points if they are wanting to study four A Levels?</b>
A	We are aware that students studying Chemistry, Economics or Physics as part of four A Levels are very often aspiring towards the most competitive university admissions. Students in this position are not well served by achieving anything less than top grades and historically students with slightly lower GCSE profiles have underperformed when taking four A Levels including one or more of these subjects. To achieve well in four A Levels requires a track record of significant independent study especially in these challenging courses. Therefore, if you wish to study four A Levels and opt for one or more of these subjects, then you need a minimum of 60 points.
<b>Q</b>	<b>How do I find out more about boarding?</b>
A	For year 12 entry in September we will have a number of weekly boarding places available. Tours of the Boarding Houses will be available at the Sixth Form Open Evening. We will also be offering a "trial evening" in boarding for applicants who attend the Consultation Meetings scheduled in March.

<b>Q</b>	<b>When do I need to register formally for a sixth form place following my conditional offer?</b>
A	Registration for internal students of Reading School will take place after students have received their GCSE results on Thursday 20 <sup>th</sup> August 2020. External applicants are asked to send an electronic copy of their examination results to the admissions office by 11am on Thursday 20 <sup>th</sup> August 2020. They are then asked to attend a sixth form registration on the morning of Friday 21 <sup>st</sup> August 2020. Further details will be sent out with conditional offers in March 2020.

<b>Q</b>	<b>Do I need to be living in the designated area for my son to be admitted as a day student?</b>
A	The designated area is determined by the postcode of the student's home address and guidance on the designated area is given in the School prospectus and on the school website. Further clarification can be obtained from the School's Admission Office. Places will be offered to applicants who reside within the designated area by the sixth form registration date (21st August 2020) following the GCSE results. This must be the student's permanent home address with their parent(s) / carer(s), e.g. the address where the student is registered with a GP. In the cases where parents have shared responsibility for a student, the permanent address will be where the student stays for the majority of the school week (Monday to Friday) and the school may ask for documentary evidence to support the application. Students applying for day places from outside the designated area will only be considered if all the available places cannot be filled by students from within the designated area or by boarders.
