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Introduction

As we move towards the end of the 2021-2022 Academic Year it is fitting to review our progress and celebrate how our students are flourishing. Furthermore, it is also an opportunity to look forward and consider how we can continue to champion high performance and excellence with compassion. In awarding the prestigious Kitemark plus, the Association for Character Education emphasised 'Reading School's exemplary and inspirational commitment to values-led character education for all.' The award should act as a catalyst for further improvement and provide an impetus for further opportunities for staff and students to flourish. The award is a validation of the inspirational leadership of Tom Evans (Assistant Head Personal Development), Ben Miller (Head of Philosophy and Theology) and Mr Bob Kenwrick (Chair of Governors), along with recognition that our approach is a team effort which has produced what the assessor, Mr Gary Lewis, termed 'A heady mix of the theoretical and the practical which characterises an inspirational approach.'

As the Headmaster's Weekly Bulletin is simplified to incorporate an emphasis on Academic Excellence, Belonging and Community, some key aspects of proposed priorities for 2022-2023 are shared with the Reading School community below.

Academic Excellence

Reading School continues to prioritise a holistic approach to education, the Reading Way, that values academic and character excellence, ensuring the development of a sound mind and a sound body. The importance of developing scholarship and independent learning should be emphasised in all subject areas, in line with our focus on 'Learn, Lead, Serve.' The prize giving events scheduled for next week exemplify how we value academic, character and sporting excellence.

Admissions

Reading School continues to prioritise students from disadvantaged backgrounds through commitment to the levelling up goals architecture (Dec 2022).

Belonging and Boarding

The concept and reality of Belonging be strengthened further through:

- Belonging Week (June 2023),
- Reading Week (October 2022), and
- Review of Boarding best practice linked to NMS (September 2022)
- Celebration of belonging through 'Grand Reunion' Alumni events coordinated by the Society Office working towards the 900th anniversary of the founding of Reading School.

Cultural Capital and Character Leadership

The development of cultural capital and character is prioritised so that all students, including those from disadvantaged backgrounds, are afforded opportunities to develop character, shaped by the findings of the Cummins Review and the National Character Association Kitemark scheme criteria. (October 2022). This is to include characterful leadership in the Sixth Form.

Commitment, Compassion and Community

The Klitschko programme will be developed further, linked to the Future Stories International funding stream provided by the Reading Foundation. (December 2022)

Further, the positive influence and impact of parents and different generations of families associated with the Reading School community must be acknowledged. The leadership of Miss Lizzie Ayres in this respect is especially worthy of note.

In addition, the strategic direction of Reading School should be explicitly reconsidered with particular focus on the development of a Parenting Engagement one-year programme, a plan for the development of community relations and partnerships, as exemplified by our emerging local partnerships with Berkshire Vision (and the Royal Berkshire Hospital) should be a key feature of a refreshed emphasis on place and relationships (December 2022) and a refreshed Strategic Development Plan 2023-2027, (July 2023).

Excellence

Reframing Pain

Mrs J Pickering, Teacher of Biology, EPQ & Medical School Applications Coordinator led eleven Year 12 students who all attended the 'Reframe Pain' Conference, hosted at Queen Anne's School earlier this term. The conference welcomed aspiring healthcare professionals who got to hear about new advances and the complexities of pain medicine and the latest physiotherapy, psychology and neuroscience research.

As part of the conference, a challenge was shared with all attending schools, which included Edgbarrow School, Leighton Park School, Queen Anne's School, Alton School and Kendrick School. Students were challenged to create and submit a creative form of media to help communicate the best pain management techniques aimed at patients and first prize was awarded to Padmanaban A (12W) for his informative and engaging animation which can be viewed by clicking the thumbnail below.



Character Education



Our school has been on a journey that has seen our values and ethos being made explicit and shared with the whole school community in order to develop and strengthen good character in young people. Our collective efforts have led to Reading School being awarded the ACE Kitemark Plus Award following a visit this week by Gary Lewis and Carole Black from the Association for Character Education. Gary and Carole spent a day observing

all aspects of our school's character education provision and meeting with students and staff to discuss the work that goes on in promoting character development along with investigating what this looks like. Gary and Carole met with staff and students as well as spending time in lessons and observing our future stories program.

We are very pleased to announce that Reading School has been awarded the 'Character Education Kitemark Plus'. This accreditation is awarded by the Association for Character Education to schools that take an explicit, planned and reflective approach to the cultivation of positive character in their pupils, in the interest of creating well-rounded individuals. The award, which considers the culture, ethos and practical examples of character development across the school, has been developed in response to growing recognition of the role of character education in successful schools. It is therefore indicative of the huge breadth of academic and co-curricular opportunities that Reading School offers its students and the enthusiasm and hard work of all Reading School staff in cultivating a thriving school community in which our students can flourish.

The School of Character Kitemark is a quality mark of the educational charity Association for Character Education (ACE), first established in 2015 to respond to the growing interest in character education in Britain. It was established by a group of well-known head-teachers, academics and other educationalists who recognised the desire of many schools to enhance their character education provision.

Excellence in the Community



Our partnership work has included recent efforts to build stronger links with the University of Reading and this has seen guest lecturer, Professor James Reade present his 'The Economics of Sport' lecture to Year 12 Economics students in June. Furthermore, we also supported the Reading Community Cup, a charity football event organised by the University of Reading to celebrate Refugee Week 2022. Our student, Prabhav B (10W) attended the event in order to put his photographic skills to use and he shared:

"The event was definitely worth a Saturday morning of work. Thoroughly enjoyed being there. The players asked whether I do photography full time and was pretty funny considering they didn't seem to understand I was 15 and doing this as volunteering! Getting to do volunteering work at the University of Reading was an incredibly satisfying and fulfilling experience - even more so because photography, being at community events and working with people, are things I've always enjoyed doing.

Making an impact



Future Stories is our school's social mobility project which works in partnership with local primary schools and the community, to support students from disadvantaged backgrounds. Recognised as a Finalist in the <u>UK Social Mobility Awards</u>, over the past 12 months our Future Stories programme has improved, developed and expanded so it benefits more children and young people, while levelling the playing

field for those from lower-income families. We wanted to celebrate some of the achievements of the past year along with celebrate the contribution of our inspirational team of students and staff who give up their time to serve our local community in a powerful and meaningful way.

Future Stories - Mentoring

Our Maths mentoring program has developed in scope and is now supported by schools who bring young students to Reading School on a weekly basis to take part in developmental mentoring sessions. This year, over 60 of our sixth form students have delivered weekly mentoring sessions in Maths and English to disadvantaged students in Years 4, 5 and 6 who all attend primary schools in our local community that we have partnered with. The sessions focus on Maths but are also catalysts for improving the self-esteem of primary school students. In addition to improving their level of attainment in Maths, students are also more positive and engaged in their learning and more confident in their problem-solving skills.

Future Stories - Science and Me



We also piloted a science program this summer in partnership with <u>Johnson Matthey</u> which saw over 200 primary school students, who may face barriers to participating in science, taking part in STEM sessions. The collaboration contributed to transforming how young people engage with science-related subjects so that inspiration and attitudes could be shaped.

Future Stories - Sports Programs

Over the course of this term's Belonging Week, we also ran a series of sporting sessions, tournaments and competitions at Reading School and within local primary schools.

We are looking forward to expanding these programs in 2023 and thanks to Mr S Allen, Mr M Kearle and Mr A Robertson for leading these exciting programmes that create leadership opportunities for our students as well as inspiring younger students through their participation.



Future Stories also contributed to a program led by The Cowshed, Care4Calais and 52 Lives which saw families seeking asylum being supported during the May half term. Thank you to Mr K Luteijn and Mr T Casemore for leading this and to all the students that willingly gave up their time during their holidays.

During August this year, the Future Stories Summer Camp will take place on Tuesday 30th and Wednesday 31st August. This 2-day summer camp will support disadvantaged Year 5 students with their preparation for the Reading School entrance exam. Activities will include opportunities to develop skills in confidence, leadership and team work and the camp will be led by Mrs C Heston and Mrs P Hickman. Sessions will be run by Reading School sixth form students and staff.

Partnerships within our local community




As part of our ongoing work in partnering with local organisations within our community, we hosted an art exhibition this week organised by Berkshire Vision, a charity established in 1910 in order to provide support for visually impaired children and adults. The charity, based opposite our school on Erleigh Road offers a range of support including social activities, a befriending service, adapted sports, employability services and remote activities.

The art exhibition offered an opportunity for Berkshire Vision members to share and talk about their experiences of creating art with limited vision, along with helping to change perceptions of sight loss. 
Grandparents Day 2022

Year 10 Geography Field Trip to Margam, South Wales

From Sunday 3rd – Wednesday 6th July, 99 year 10 students visited the Margam Discovery Centre situated in the beautiful Margam Park near Port Talbot to undertake their GCSE Geography fieldwork. Over the four days, the students visited the Cardiff Bay regeneration and travelled the length of the River Ogmore to undertake two geographical enquiries. At the river sample sites all the students got stuck in wandering about the river in their wellies collecting data such as velocity and sediment size. In Cardiff Bay they worked in groups to carry out an environmental quality survey and questionnaires with members of the public.
