



# **Headmaster's Weekly Bulletin**

14 OCTOBER 2022



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### Introduction

My introduction this week is longer than normal and this is intentional, following a report being submitted to the school's Governing Board, which detailed key strategic priorities and themes which I would like to share in an edited form with our school community for the purpose of transparency and accountability.

As people involved in education, and as parents, we should be dealers in hope. Cynicism is the incorrect approach to dealing with the challenges of modern life. If our young people do not dream of what opportunities there might be to flourish, then it is unlikely that they will be idealistic as they develop and grow. At Reading School our staff seek to inspire. We are committed to providing the best opportunities that state education can provide. Based on character, aptitude and intellectual ability we seek to enable barriers to be overcome.

It is a truism that everyone has the right to dream. However, I would contend that we should not expect to achieve our dream if we are not willing to help others achieve theirs. Our commitment to the Reading Way demonstrates courage — we believe in both academic excellence and developing people of character. Team players rather than selfish individuals. Individuals who appreciate being part of something greater than themselves. People want to add value by giving back rather than taking. We want our students to be conscious and wary of any sense of entitlement or an arrogant attitude.

The Danish philosopher Soren Kierkegaard maintained that 'To dare is to lose one's footing momentarily. Not to dare is to lose oneself.' My challenge to students and parents is to support our desire for our young people to strive towards being the best versions of themselves. We can shape a positive future story together, which emphasises academic and character excellence, belonging and community.

#### Safeguarding



In addition, it is necessary to continue to ensure that our staff and students are aware of the importance of a strong safeguarding culture, as an integral feature of the Reading Way. Safeguarding at Reading School is currently undergoing an external safeguarding review, undertaken by RW Consulting, with many areas of best practice highlighted. The safeguarding 'deep dive' has already encompassed boarding, and will continue to review Designated Safeguarding Lead roles, safeguarding and child protection cases, staff training, admissions, allegations, vulnerable students, external providers and visitors, careers and work experience, and alternative provision. This evidences our commitment to being vigilant and strengthening our strong culture of safeguarding to ensure Reading School remains a safe place for our school community.

### Purpose and the Right to Dream

Furthermore, we must dare to dream and be a purpose-driven organisation, shaped by our core values and the Reading Way. This can be accomplished by championing a narrative of a positive future story. Excellence in all areas is our stated aim. The quality of education along with emphasis on personal development ensures that we aim to go beyond compliance. It is important to fear less and dream more. We need to be more strategic and long term in our thinking, driven by our purpose rather than buffeted by the winds of education policy that sees three Education Secretaries in one week.

This is why at Reading School we are mindful of the responsibilities we have in being stewards of a 900-year organisation. In being grounded by our purpose and our core values, we can shape our operational and strategic priorities over the next 5 years to ensure healthy high performance.

The work of Owen Eastwood which emphasises Belonging has been chosen as the Governing Board 'Reading Week Book Choice' for October 2022. It is more than a symbolic choice as it emphasises one of our key drivers and priorities for 2022-2023. I was also pleased to have the opportunity to mention the work we are undertaking to promote reading on <a href="Radio Berkshire">Radio Berkshire</a> yesterday. Indeed, the work of Ms Loralie Kesteven and her team, needs to be lauded along with that of Miss P Ellis and all departments.



How fortunate we are to have such staff dedicated to providing opportunities for our students to flourish. It is vital we can dream that excellence is attainable and available to people from all backgrounds. Thus, we need to redouble our efforts to provide opportunities for our staff and students to work towards being the best versions of themselves.

It is important that we cast our net wide in the community for talented people and students with aptitude and the right attitude. People who will help build a culture that is shaped by our values. This includes people who know how to adapt, thrive and flourish in challenging conditions. We want to inspire our people, maximise opportunities and demonstrate what excellence can look like, in the classroom, on the sporting field and beyond.



Academic excellence is central to our ethos but it is not the end goal of our dream. Rather we should have an expanded dream that prioritises the broader development of our students so that they flourish in terms of character, leadership and being positive active global citizens. Evidence of this can be seen in many forms, including a new student society launched today which focuses on 'Effective Altruism' and where all year groups are welcome.

Reading School should be viewed as a school of character, a school of opportunity, where we encourage each young person to become the best version of themselves. Therefore, we seek to develop an ecosystem of opportunities, through investing in building trusting relationships and partnerships and seeking long-term successes.

Academic and competitive success can go hand in hand with being purposedriven. We want to enable opportunities to do things better and do things sustainably. Our purpose is to deliver a consistently exceptional educational experience at Reading School, leading to excellent outcomes. We seek consistently exceptional outcomes for our students, regardless of background, through raising ambition and standards.

#### Academic Excellence

Data should be a handmaiden, a tool rather than an answer in itself. The excellent work of Mr P Stromdale and Dr C Kennedy, both recently seconded to the Senior Leadership Team, in the related spheres of data, standards and attitudinal mentoring, corroborates the view that a nuanced view of performance data is necessary if we are to add value. One of the key performance indicators is focused on A\*- B was 93.3% in 2022. 50.3% at A\* was amongst our highest historically. 88.7% of GCSE grades awarded were 9-7. These were exceptional outcomes that we should rightly celebrate and current students should seek to emulate.

#### **Admissions**

A key focus of our purpose relates to the value placed on academic excellence as measured, for instance, through external and internal assessments or examinations. Nevertheless, our definition of purpose, shaped by the advice of Dr J Naish, is wider than academic results. Our purpose is influenced by our commitment to healthy, high performance whereby all our people, staff and students, should be supported to work towards becoming the best versions of themselves, through the provision of fresh and fair opportunities. We continue to be committed to widening opportunity for students with aptitude, attitude and ability.

#### Belonging

Culture is also a significant aspect of our approach as we strive to nurture an inclusive strategy that enables our core values to be put into action. This is exemplified in our approach to going beyond compliance in Boarding through the eyes of an external consultant. Significantly, belonging is emphasised in our inspirational Electives programme and our Future Stories initiative, which constitute crucial parts of our eco-system of purpose-driven opportunities.

### Character, Leadership & Empowering Women

Ms L Ayres has ensured that we play a leading role nationally in seeking to develop more diverse senior teams. The substantive female members of the Senior Leadership Team at Reading School are inspirational role models and their outstanding performance is supplemented by talented women seconded to the Team in 2022-2023, Dr C Kennedy (pictured), Ms A Stratford and Ms S Rogers.

Indeed, it is also pleasing to note the refreshing and reordering of Character and Service in the Sixth Form, linked to the positive influence of Dr P Cummins and the leadership of Head of Sixth Form, Mr A Lloyd. Influenced by our Lead, Learn and Serve philosophy and the emphasis on leadership as service, the Sixth Form are explicitly focusing on developing character in 2022-2023. Responding to the positive advice and influence of Dr Phil Cummins, Head of Sixth Form, Mr A Lloyd is ensuring that Sixth Formers are 'giving back' and providing others with the opportunities to be the best version of themselves.



#### **Community & Partnerships**

Influenced by the inspirational approach prior to the Second World War of Reading School to the Kindertransport, contemporary leaders are demonstrating a creative, purpose-driven approach to developing our approaches to working successfully with Ukrainian refuges (Students, both boys and girls and their mothers).

Having helped match 53 Ukrainian refugee families with local hosts, Senior Leaders became increasingly aware as guests arrived that there was a lack of local school places at both primary and secondary phases of education. It became clear that no nationwide policy or provision was planned to ameliorate this issue and so in the Spring the Deputy Headmaster met, and worked with two local MPs and local directors of education on a Ukrainian Virtual School pilot project.



Having supported three appeals for school places for Ukrainian families, Reading School's leadership team eventually established that Ukrainian young people who were enrolled in their own schools could be permitted to attend Reading School as guests and could access elements of the Reading School curriculum whilst also being given safe space for their own studies. Reading School staff and students have, as would be hoped, risen once more to the opportunities afforded to them. Junior students are consistently translating and supporting their Ukrainian peers, have embraced the addition of new friends, and have witnessed the school doing all it can to 'do the right thing'.

Staff have volunteered time to run trips in the holidays, to provide English lessons and to provide catch-up work. The exceptional work of Dr C. Evans, Ms L Kesteven, Mr K Luteijn, Mr S Pedlow and Mr T Evans has made this scheme possible.

Furthermore, in 2022-2023 the Ukrainian Support Programme funded by Reading Borough Council, and organised through the auspices our Future Stories programme, we are proud to share details of a new activity program which will provide weekly sessions for Ukrainian young people from November 2022. Offered to up to 40 young people weekly at Reading School, these start on the 9th November. The first six weeks are focused on team building and social interaction with a range of activities and trips that will explore the importance of collaboration.

There is much to look forward to in achieving our strategic goals as a Reading School Community.

### Reminder - Annual Commemoration Service 2022 on Friday 21 October 2022

Each year we celebrate the founding of Reading School and its historic ties with the Borough of Reading by holding a service at the Reading Minster of St. Mary-the-Virgin. Our service this year is more poignant, given that it will be the first in-person service in 2 years. This will take place on **Friday 21st October at 14:00**. The service should be finished by approximately 15:00. We regret that, due to space limitations, we are unable to accommodate parents or carers at the service. We would nevertheless value your co-operation in ensuring your son is in his smartest possible uniform for this occasion, and are pleased to inform you of the logistics of the event:

#### Year 7, 8, 9 & 12 and 13 students ONLY

All students will have lessons as normal until Period 4

Mr O Griffin (Head of Music) has notified musicians involved in the ceremony. These students need to be excused from Period 3 so that they can meet at Music School for 10:00 to be escorted to the Minster for rehearsals (this list will include Year 10 musicians who are participating).

Lunch will be served from 11.55 to 12.30 and tutor registration for these year groups will take place at 12:35 in normal form rooms.

After registration and form time, junior students will be escorted **to and from** the Minster by staff and senior students (Sixth Form Prefects and senior students assisting will be notified separately via Teams).

All other sixth formers will be allowed to make their own way to the Minster with registration taking place at the Minster and will be dismissed from the Minster after the service.

Students should be **smartly dressed in full school uniform**. If they have games that morning, they must bring their uniform to change into.

It should be noted that students are <u>not</u> permitted to take bags with them to the Minster as there is simply not enough space for bags to be stored safely. Therefore, bags should be left in lockers at School or in the Chapel (for those who do not have lockers).

All students <u>must</u> return to school with staff and senior students after the service to collect their belongings before we begin half term.

Please note that there will be **no** lunchtime or after school clubs on this day.

Horseman coaches are booked to depart from school, as usual, at 15:40 and will not leave without students.

Except for religious exemptions, all students in the year groups above will be participating in this event. However, if you do **not** wish your son to attend, arrangements have been made so that he will be supervised at school during the afternoon. Due to the capacity at the Minster, we are unable to have all the school attend, therefore, **Year 10 and 11 students will remain at school.** 

Year 10 and 11 students will then have their normal lessons up to Period 5 which will run from 11:55 to 12:35 for both year groups.

Lunch for pupils in Years 10 & 11 will be served from 12.40 to 13.25.

Year 10 students will be undertaking supervised HPQ work in the JKB or LRC. They should line up outside the LRC at 13:25. School will finish at 15:25 as usual.

Year 11 students will be undertaking an English GCSE mock exam in Big School and other classrooms. They should line up outside on the terrace at 13:25. School will finish at 15:25 as usual.

### **Geography Trip to the Azores – Easter 2023**

The Geography Department are delighted to announce that we are once again organising a trip to the Azores in Easter 2023. The provisional dates for this trip are 31st March to 4th April (5 days/4 nights). The trip is available to students in Years 10 and 12 studying Geography with the aim to support their studies undertaken at school, particularly volcanic landforms and energy security studied at both GCSE and A Level. The Azores islands were formed through volcanic activity and provide a perfect location to see a verity of volcanic processes and landforms and experience how the islands have harnessed geothermal power.

A wide range of excursions and activities are provisionally planned, including:

- Furnas Valley interpretation centre and caldera lakes
- Furnas Geothermal Village
- · Hot springs, fumaroles and botanical gardens
- Tea planation visit grown in the mineral rich volcanic soils
- · Whale watching trip
- · Lago de Fuego caldera lake
- · Caldera Velha hot spring
- Geothermal power plant visit and Salto do Cabrito Waterfall
- · Sete Cidades and caldera lake
- · Ponta Delgada town exploration
- Walk through the Gruta do Carvao lava tube and caves
- Pineapple plantation visit

The cost of this trip is expected to be around £950. This price in is based on 30 students attending this trip. In the event that significantly fewer students express interest in this trip, we will not go ahead with the booking as this will increase the costs significantly. In the event that the trip is oversubscribed, students will be randomly selected.

This price includes:

- · Return airport transfers by coach
- ATOL protection
- Full board accommodation
- · Professional guides
- · All excursions, evening activities, entrance fees and coach transfers whilst in the Azores

This is an enrichment trip and is therefore not a compulsory element of either the GCSE or A level geography course. However, it would undoubtedly aid your son's understanding and appreciation of some of the key geographical issues connected with plate tectonics, hazards and energy issues.

We do require a quick turnaround to secure the lowest price possible for the trip. Please note that your son will have to be in the possession of an EHIC Card and a Passport valid for the proposed duration of the stay and photocopies of these will be requested at a later stage. The Azores are Portuguese Islands and may require a Visa for non-UK or EU passport holders. It is your responsibility to ensure that visa requirements have been checked and if necessary, applied for in good time before the trip.

The trip is being booked through an experienced tour company. They work closely with us during the whole tour planning process to ensure that your child will get the very best learning experience whilst away.

### **Excellence in Computer Coding**

Python was the selected language for all students, although they had free range to use libraries and the whole-day coding competition ran from 08:30 to 15:15 on Friday 23rd September.

Some groups planned to make it artificially intelligent and it was clear there were no bounds to the students' enthusiasm and desire to develop the most outstanding and distinguished design of a game. This craving for success would come back to bite them in the back (or is it byte them in the RAM) as providing a fully functional finished game at the end of the day was certainly a challenge.

Well done to all who joined us for the whole day of coding. This event will certainly be run again at the beginning of the next academic year.

### **Doughnut Sale: Wednesday 19th October**



We have had numerous suggestions from the team, and were so overwhelmed by choice, that we decided the entire community of Reading School should have the opportunity to share what they feel about our climate and environment. We have already had nearly 100 responses.




