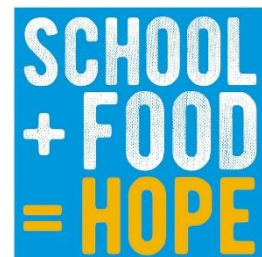
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In addition, on Monday 21 November, we welcomed Mr Peter Higgins, co-founder of renowned menswear outlet Charles Tyrwhitt, and non-executive director for [Mary's Meals](#), one of Reading School's charity partners for 2022-2023. Peter came to deliver two talks during his visit, to share his insights and experience in entrepreneurship, leadership and charity. He spoke of the importance of making a service or product different and learning from mistakes, while describing how the first million is the hardest but to persevere; focus on quality, value and service; surround yourself with great people; and with a bit of luck too, a business will grow. While running a business can be stressful, it can also be rewarding and fun. One of the students who attended said: *"Mr Higgins gave a fantastic talk that highlighted the struggles of a start-up in a competitive environment. He articulated how he learnt to be determined, gain 'on the job' experience and learn from his mistakes."*

We look forward to our sixth formers putting their entrepreneurial skills into practice by raising money for Mary's Meals this year, which, Peter says, can help when applying for jobs, as you stand out from the crowd by evidencing leadership, teamwork and beating a target. Our school's response to Black Friday is to give to others rather than spend our time searching for a potentially spurious bargain for something that we do not actually need.

We have set a target of raising £3000 for Mary's meals through our non-uniform day today and other activities led by our Charity prefects. We want love to reach everywhere and support the vision of Mary's meals that every child should receive one daily meal in their place of education. The charity is named in honour of Mary, the mother of Jesus, who brought up her own son in poverty. Every day, the charity feeds over 2.2 million hungry children every school day across twenty countries, including Malawi, Kenya and Haiti. It costs £15.90 to feed a child for a whole year, so our generous donations can go a long way to making a difference. I would like to thank both Peter and, Engagement Manager at Marys Meals, Catherine Haines for making it all happen!



The importance of doing the right thing and building relationships, partnerships and communities cannot be underestimated. Our purpose is to provide opportunities to flourish in both academic excellence and character excellence and in this spirit, I would like to take this opportunity to share a letter that I recently received from the Head teacher of one of our Ukrainian guests (*translated from Ukrainian to English*):

Dear Mr Robson,

Our School, as well as all the Ukrainians, are grateful for your support of the education system of Ukraine through your initiative, aimed at temporarily displaced Ukrainians, who were forced to leave the country due to the Russian invasion. We are grateful for your welcome to our student; we highly appreciate that he can attend your school within the exchange programme. Your contribution to the support of the educational process is massive, as this is important for the future of Ukrainians and Ukraine as a nation. We are aiming at establishing the links between our school and partner schools all over Europe.

We appreciated the report and the programme that you shared with us. We are sure that once the war is won, our school team will happily visit Reading School and we would really like to welcome your school team to visit Ukraine and our school, to exchange best practices, which will definitely lead to the implementation of joint educational projects."

Thank you to our whole school community for supporting our initiatives to provide opportunities for young people to flourish and supporting our commitment to adding value through acts that build relationships and community.



In closing, at the end of last term, 100 Reading School students in Year 8 and Year 10 took part in a research project with [Professor Andrew Peterson](#) from the [Jubilee Centre for Character and Virtues](#) at the University of Birmingham to conduct some primary research for the '[Civic Virtues Through Service to Others](#)' project being conducted by the university.

The final report has been published by the Jubilee Centre and can be found here [Schools, Civic Virtues and the Good Citizen](#).

The Civic Virtues Through Service to Others project examined the meaning of civic virtues in contemporary public life and education in the UK. The *Schools, Civic Virtues and the Good Citizen* report presents findings from the project and tells us how school leaders, teachers and pupils understand civic virtues, the idea of the good citizen and the approaches and experiences involved in schools. Some key findings of the report include:

- School leaders viewed preparing pupils to be good citizens to be a core and important part of education and schooling.
- Teachers perceived the teaching of all categories of virtues – including civic virtues – to be very important.
- Intellectual, moral, civic and performance virtues were all considered to be important for being a good citizen – but particular emphasis was placed on moral virtues. Moral virtues were viewed as both central to good citizenship and as foundational for developing civic virtues.
- Where school leaders, teachers and pupils perceived a very close relationship between the good person and the good citizen, the reasons given focussed on either the mutual connection of these virtues and/or on the idea that being a good person acts as a precursor for being a good citizen.
- Though still regarding intellectual virtues as important for being a good citizen, teachers and pupils viewed them as less important than moral, civic and performance virtues in that regard.

The Jubilee Centre sends its thanks to the students from Reading School involved in the research. *"Your involvement in this research has not only contributed significantly to our wider understanding of civic virtues in education and the virtues of a good citizen but will also support policymakers and the third sector with their endeavours to design a policy environment that cultivates civic virtues and an active civic citizenry"*.

On Monday 21 November a group of our Boarding students visited with the [Reading Refugee Support Group](#) to present money that had been raised for them during student led charity events. The group was met by Fundraising and Communications Manager, Jonjo Warrick who gave our students a tour around their offices.

Reading Refugee Support Group (RRSG) is committed to reducing poverty, suffering and social isolation of people who have faced persecution and hardship. It also supports individuals and families seeking asylum along with those given status to remain in the UK. RRSG has less than 10 employees however the organisation helps between 1,500 - 2,000 refugees a year.

Our students would like to thank all those who supported the recent events that raised money for Reading Refugee Support Group and have shared this update in order to update you on the work of the charities that funds are given to along with the impact it makes to the lives of vulnerable people and families.

Mary's Meals started feeding 200 children in Malawi in 2002 and now twenty years on, is feeding more than 2 million children every school day.
