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Introduction

I have recently highlighted that Reading School is in the business of creating opportunities and dreams for all our students and today's Bulletin provides ample evidence of what this looks like at Reading School.

The Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development maintains that '*high performance and greater equity in educational opportunities and outcomes are not mutually exclusive.*' The purpose of Reading School is linked to excellence, high performance and equity of opportunity. We ensure that academically able students, regardless of background, receive inspirational opportunities that enable them to flourish. We must renew our commitment to making a difference and adding value. Providing opportunities for all our students is at the forefront of educational discourse for Reading School leaders and governors.

It is important to cultivate a model for developing people, which emphasises the nurturing of purpose, character and leadership. Our strategy and programmes are shaped by a purposeful approach that creates opportunity for young people to discover the best versions of themselves. As an educational beacon of excellence, we also have a moral duty to educate and protect vulnerable students and strive to promote equity, social mobility, inclusion, character and academic excellence. We can add value and inspire young people of all backgrounds to flourish and we must not limit aspiration, subdue dreams or suppress ambitions.

We believe that excellence can be found anywhere. None of us are born excellent. It is earned through disciplined effort and the building of character. It requires resilience, passion, integrity and commitment. We believe that with aptitude, talent and the right degree of support, excellence can emerge. It can be found in the classroom, on the pitch and beyond. It is important to dream that excellence is attainable and available to young people who come from all backgrounds.

In order to provide opportunities for positive future stories, we need to show enterprise and cast our net wide in the community for talented young people. Young people who will be enabled by our approach, values and methods, to express their ability, aptitude and potential. Indeed, we work with purpose and take a long-term view of the process of developing our young people. We contend that our students have the right to dream of a life of opportunities that enable personal and organisational flourishing. We believe in expanding dreams, not squashing them. This can be achieved if we work in partnership with students and parents to maximise engagement.

Crucially, strong and positive relationships should be at the heart of our culture as a community. If children and young people have consistent experiences of being safe, healthy, nurtured and respected, they will then develop knowledge, skills and resilience. We should seek to unlock talent and enable the fulfilling of potential. In a forthcoming National Report on Character Education and School Improvement, Mr B Miller, Character Lead at Reading School, maintains that "*At its core, character is about community. It is about learning how to fulfil your potential and play an active role as a good citizen in a diverse world.*" Indeed, at Reading School we seek opportunities to develop, role model, scaffold and promote character excellence in all its forms.

We are ambitious for our students and staff. We do not want them to be passive bystanders, or onlookers who do not take responsibility. We want to lift the barriers to participation and strive to develop our culture of commitment. This edition of the Headmaster's Weekly Bulletin illuminates the range, depth and quality of opportunities provided, inspired by committed staff, governors, parents and students.

We see Year 12 Inspire Lectures for future physicists, Geographical Association Worldwide quizzes and Inspire Lectures for students of Geography, Classics and cultural capital being brought alive for Year 9 Latin students, week-long celebrations to mark the beginning of the Chinese Year of the Rabbit, perspectives being widened through the 10th Anniversary of Reading Book Week (sponsored by the Old Redingensian Association) and social enterprise for the benefit of the local community being transformed from theory to practice. 

National Education Union (NEU) Industrial Action

As you may be aware, the NEU have balloted to go on strike and reached the numbers required to do so. They have announced that strike action will take place on the following days:

- 1 February 2023
- 2 March 2023
- 15 and 16 March 2023

We will communicate with parents and students regarding the impact of the strike on the operation of Reading School by NEU members scheduled for 1 February as soon as we are able.

Boarding will remain fully operational throughout the period of strikes and it is an expectation of the Department for Education that all reasonable steps are taken by the Headteacher, to keep the school open for as many students as possible.

Excellence in Sport

Siddarth S (13W) will be running in a [London Half Marathon in March 2023](#) in order to raise money for local charity [Sport in Mind](#). His goal is to raise money to contribute to improving the lives of children and young people experiencing mental health issues. Siddarth was interviewed earlier this week to find out more:

Can you tell us why you chose to run a half-marathon?



Sport and exercise have been huge parts of my life and I got into running recently, just because I wanted something new to do, something fresh. I also always had a goal to run some sort of event and I wanted to push myself, so chose a half marathon which seemed realistic and achievable, but also tough. Essentially, I found a race which I was interested in running in, and also a charity which I was really interested in raising money for.

Why did you choose Sport in Mind as your chosen charity?

Sport in Mind is a local mental health charity that has a mission to improve the lives of people experiencing poor mental health through sport and physical activity. They're based in Reading but their work takes place across a lot of the South of England. Their goal is something which I felt was really great because sport has helped me a lot with my own mental health, like playing cricket with other people, or working out regularly. Both cricket and working out has been a huge part of my life and I feel like by raising money, we can help people elsewhere. You know, we have so many sports in our school as well which is really positive. I think it's only fair that other people have access to lots of sports and activities as well.

You mention your mental health; can you share a little more about that?

Sure, everyone knows that this is a school which is prestigious and highly academic. Both are positive but it can be tough to balance, doing well in school with other things you're interested in. I think it's always great to have an outlet for times when you do feel stressed with exams or having to meet deadlines. It's important that you have a way of coping with that. And like I said, I think for me that's always been exercise and sport. Everyone who knows me, knows I'm constantly talking about sport or exercise, and it's a great way for people to cope I think.

What advice would you have for students across all years about coping with pressure?

I'd say it's really important to first of all, find something you enjoy doing. I remember in Year 8, I tried running and I absolutely hated it, but I tried it again a few months back and I started loving it. And the thing which works for one person doesn't work for everyone. So it's important that you try things out, to try new things. And you see, once you find that thing, you'll make time for it because you'll love it. You do what you enjoy.

I think growing up through Year 7, all the way up through the school, you have new things which keep coming about like exams GCSE's, A levels and applications...it doesn't really stop, but what also shouldn't stop is your ability to have a life outside of this to do things you enjoy, to be around people you enjoy and find that thing which helps you to cope.

Who supports you in your life?

I've been really fortunate to have supportive parents. They've really supported me with everything and let me do almost whatever I'm interested in...driving me for hours to cricket games, and I do appreciate that it's not easy, but also I say that a huge aspect is giving your child opportunities and my parents led me to try out cricket and to try badminton... different sports. And even, you know, during the times where I'm exercising, they're always concerned. That's bound to happen. They'll tell you don't do too much, but they never really stopped me from doing it. And that's something I really appreciate. My parents, my sister, they were all really supportive. If I were to give parents or siblings any advice, it's just talk to your children and siblings about what they enjoy. Why they enjoy it. Support them with their interests.

Finally, how are you preparing for the upcoming half marathon?

I am definitely preparing hard. The weather hasn't been kind but I'm making sure I'm running three, four times a week. Nice long runs on the weekend and just trying to build up my endurance throughout. Still keeping my strength training going on the side. But, you know, one thing I've really found is, if you enjoy it, it becomes easy. Get some tunes on, take it slow as well. It doesn't have to be fast when you're training and just enjoy the process.

Lent Term – Week 3



47 Year 9 students studying Latin, got a taste for what life would have looked and felt like, within an ancient classroom during a visit on Tuesday, to the Ure Museum of Greek Archaeology at the University of Reading. The museum of Mediterranean archaeology from ancient Greek, Egyptian, Etruscan and Roman civilisations, contains one of the most important collections of ancient Greek pottery in the United Kingdom.

Based on research into schooling in the ancient world, the 'Reading ancient schoolroom' takes place in an immersive replica of an ancient classroom, in which all students and teachers wear Roman costumes and use replica ancient writing materials including wax tablets, styluses, reed pens, inkwells, ostraca, and papyrus.

The trip was led by Teachers of Classics', Mrs G Haugvik and Mrs S Drummond, accompanied by Head of Classics & Modern Foreign Languages, Mr M Cooper.








