Thus, I am proud of the student leadership shown this week for fundraising for International Women's Day 2023, in order to purchase generators for women and children in Ukraine without power. As of Friday 10 March, we have raised £2,131, which will cover the cost of a generator to be driven to Ukraine imminently and further details are shared later in this Bulletin.

We were also pleased to receive a visit this week from Charlotte Wilshire, Fundraising Manager at Brookfields School, an Ofsted Outstanding specialist SEN School in West Reading. Charlotte visited with the Society Office and Community Relations Office on a knowledge sharing and best practice visit. During the visit she shared that the Reading School Sixth Form Charity Committer had previously fundraised for Brookfields School in 2019. The funds went towards the purchase of an 'Eye Gaze' machine which has positively and profoundly impacted the lives of children and young people with multiple additional needs. Charlotte shared, "The hard work of the Sixth Form Charity Committee makes a tremendous difference to our pupils as the Eye Gaze gives them the opportunity to communicate and interact with the wider world as well as having some fun along the way."

Compassion, kindness and parent involvement have been evident this week, with the 'own clothes day' and upcoming charity concert for Turkey and Syria, both being led by parents and Reading School students. Working together as a community, great things that impact the lives of others and ourselves, can be achieved.

Thank you to all members of the Reading School community for supporting our drive to shape a more compassionate society based on equity of opportunity, so that all can feel that they belong and subsequently can thrive and flourish.

Students in Year 7 are currently studying a number of topics on sex and relationships. The Biology curriculum includes the male and female anatomy, fertilization and pregnancy, as well as menstruation. Fundraising for Ukraine

The following is a report shared by Luke H (12W) who has led on the recent 'Own Clothes Day' fundraiser to coincide with International Women's Day 2023:

In February 2022 Ukraine had a population of 42 million people who had struggled over the previous three decades to gain freedoms that we wake up with in the UK every morning. Over the last year, they have seen an incredible attack on civilian life that has not been seen in Europe since WW2. Families have lost loved ones. It is estimated that 8 million people have left the country to find safety and another 8 million have been displaced internally*. Tens of thousands have perished. They endure power outages for days, lack of running water, lack of indoor toilets, no internet or heating or cooking facilities. These are now the norms for many across the country. The future for the Ukraine will be their young people, many of them without families now or the basic comforts that we all take for granted and in a country that is driveable within a few days from the UK.



I approached Reading School Headmaster, Mr. Robson, hoping to help those most affected by the war. His idea was to organise a fundraiser so that the school could purchase a generator to be donated to the displaced women and children. With the assistance of the Make A Difference (MAD) Foundation charity, the Naguevytsk Special School** was identified as particularly vulnerable to the effects of the war because it is situated in a smaller village. The orphanage is located 90km from Lviv and now provides shelter and education for 120 children who have lost their parents and homes in the East of the country. The battery will provide clean, efficient energy to keep the lights on in the dormitories and heat their accommodations.


I and my father, ex-Reading School Governor, Keith Holland, will drive the battery, and other items to Poland during the Easter Break where they will be met by my godfather, Mr Ted Mizuhara, who will continue the journey to Ukraine. Ted has worked with the MAD Foundation's Operation Safedrop mission previously and has provided the transport vehicle, fuel and his time-off for free. He has also donated a solar panel which will attach to the battery to convert light directly into electrical energy for use.

We would like to thank all those generous students and parents who have kindly donated to the 'Just Giving Fund' so far. It will remain open for further donations until next Friday 17 March, if you have not yet had the chance to donate and would like to do so.


"My name is Helen. My son is in Year 9 and has a talent for losing stuff. His many achievements include losing a violin, a huge box of Warhammer models and at least four lunch boxes. Because of this I decided to take on the role of Lost Property Coordinator. For his penance I make him help me sort through the lost stuff, for which I am grateful.



Each half term I collect lost property from as many places as I can around the school. These include; outside Student Services (SS) in the big box in front of the office and hanging on the back of the main SS door, under the table in the gym, on the field and in the bins by the bike sheds. I sort through the piles and create a great big list. The wet, stinking stuff, I wash, dry, and fold before dividing it into tutor groups.

With each item I look for the name tag in the back of the neck, on the front or on the care labels. I hope to see a full name which I can then track back through the system. You will be amazed how many children have the same initials, or even the same surname. Something written in biro or permanent pen is great as long as the name is readable. So often the name has blurred and is difficult to decipher. You have to remember I don't know your child's name and so if I can't read it I can't get it back to you.

Then I message any parents who are part of the Class List group. If I get hold of the parents, (they don't always reply) I can get items back to their child. Usually this is done by delivering it back to SS in a carrier bag marked with the child's name. Just for the record, SS has an amazing collection of glasses, house keys, lunch boxes, phones, calculators and pencil cases in their drawers. If your child has lost anything valuable he should ask in the SS office.





Unnamed items I try to post on the Lost property section of the Class List app. Unlabelled Coats are displayed at the Uniform Sale on a special rail. Any other unnamed uniform is sold to raise money for the pupils. There is no way we can tell which child it belongs to. All I can ask is please label your child's ties, gloves, shirts, shoes, trainers, shin pads, bags, shorts, bags, blazers, trousers, school socks and hoodies. You would not believe the number of new hoodies that come to us unnamed. I hope that helps to solve the mystery of Lost Property although there is much we still never find."

During the 'Social Entrepreneurs Elective' led by Teacher of Geography, Mr K Luteijn, Year 9 and 10 students were tasked with creating a business plan for a social enterprise that seeks to solve a local social or environmental issue. Students spent the last half-term refining their ideas, carrying out market research and writing their business plans.







During this week, student teams had to launch their businesses by delivering a 5-minute pitch to the rest of the group and taking questions. During this term, the teams will either start to run their enterprises or if they are digital, will work on their technical development. At the end of the term, each team will write an impact statement to show the positive social or environmental impact their enterprise has had.
