Reading School Statement following the death of Ruth Perry



In the Friday, 13 January 2023 edition of the Headmaster's Bulletin, we shared that we were extremely saddened to hear the news that Headteacher at Caversham Primary School, Ruth Perry, had passed away. We felt it important to mark her passing along with providing support if needed, as many of our students formerly attended Caversham Primary School and would have known Mrs Perry who was hugely respected.

As many of you may be aware, news of her passing has been prevalent this week in the national media. Specifically, Mrs Perry's family have shared that her death was a "direct result of pressure" she was under due to an Ofsted inspection at her school and, "deeply harmful" in its "implied focus on one individual". Furthermore, there has been a strong reaction from the education sector and school leaders and staff have been deeply affected by the news.

Academic Excellence

British Biology Olympiad

Reading School Year 13 Biologists overall gained an impressive 8 Gold, 10 Silver and 14 bronze medals in the competition run by the Royal Society of Biology. Receiving a gold medal in this competition demonstrates that a student is one of the most talented young biologists in the country. This year over 10,000 students from over 700 schools competed with a gold medal being awarded to the top 5% of students, a silver medal to the top 15% and a bronze medal to the top 30%.



The British Biology Olympiad challenges and stimulates students with an interest in biology to expand and extend their talents. It enables students to demonstrate their knowledge and to be suitably rewarded with publicly recognised certificates and medals. The International Biology Olympiad (IBO) will be held in Al Ain (United Arab Emirates) this year, with over sixty countries taking part. The IBO seeks to challenge by both theory and practical tests some of the top pre-university biology students in the world, with over sixty countries taking part.

Haileybury Model United Nations



Several of our 6th Formers participated in the largest Model United Nations conference in the UK to learn how to shape a better world for the future last weekend from the 18 – 19 March.

Haileybury Model United Nations (HMUN) is a, 'role-playing activity, in which students assume the roles of delegates representing various countries in the committees of the United Nations and tasked with solving a range of global issues through research, lobbying, and debate.'

Well done to Bobson M, who won an award as a distinguished delegate and Jack L won an award as an honourable mention. We spoke with Jack L this week and he shared his entertaining recollection of events with us:



"Xin Chao, (or hello in Vietnamese) readers of the Headmaster's Bulletin from the Delegation of Vietnam. On Friday, 17 March, the Delegation of Vietnam, comprising of myself (12 BOW), Adam M (12 EF), Harry L (), James R (TF), Bobson M (12 MD), and Elijah G (13 BOW), set out for Haileybury school in Hereford to take part in a Model UN (MUN) which schools from both the UK and other countries would attend.

The expedition was punctuated by frantic last-minute preparation and reviews of what we had researched in the build-up to the weekend, accompanied by conversations about what we hoped to achieve from this trip. After a two-hour drive, which Mr Whitehorn and Mr Casemore no doubt felt had been stretched out to eternity due to the intellectually stimulating conversations about modernity that had sprung up during the journey, we finally arrived. Upon arrival, we were greeted by a sprawling expanse of sports fields and buildings and wondered how we would navigate this maze-like school.

After speeches from an ambassador of Eswatini and talks from the school director, we were split off into our committees and thrown into the deep end. Here, we spent the weekend engaged in spirited debates on current issues, such as reducing the economic inequality between developed and developing countries and establishing a nuclear-free weapon zone in the Middle East. Tensions were high during the debates; diplomacy seemed to be an impossibility as a large-scale walkout was staged by myself to protest the USA's proposal of being able to station their nuclear weapons in the Middle East. This walkout resulted in the resolution failing to pass and played a significant part in the relations between different countries, and resulted in the formation of a Bloc with the sole intention of annexing the USA.



The MUN ended with a General Assembly (GA), which consisted of the entirety of the participants in the committees. There was a state of alert after the morning's events, only heightened by the Israeli delegation standing up to protest the attendance of Palestine in the GA and murmurs of an invasion of the US that originated from the walkout in the morning. However, despite the rumblings, the GA proved to be the ultimate test for any resolution and diplomatic relations as a whole. Only one resolution was passed out of the 213 approved by the resolution council throughout the weekend- a clear illustration of the immense tensions between Blocs. The passing of this resolution caused a hearty round of applause that highlighted the difficulty of reaching a consensus on any issue in the UN and reaching a solution.

After the applause died down and people had regained their composure, the Secretary-General began to talk about the events of the conference and what they represented. The Head Chairs of each committee also gave a short speech that reflected on the highlights of the weekend- from the US calling for the removal of the UK and France's veto power in the Security Council to the sombre solitary walkout of the Pakistan delegate in the Special Committee, contrasted with one of the largest walkouts in recent years in the Disarmament Committee. Curiously, a common strand was present in every committee - the sudden influx of pineapples being charitably gifted to the chairs as a sign of commitment to diplomacy and cooperation in international issues, which was emphasised to be in no way related to the decisions in favour of the Country that provided the fruitful bounty.

The weekend concluded with a presentation of awards in which Vietnam, unfortunately, just missed out on being named one of the best delegations but succeeded in achieving a Highly Commended award in the Disarmament Committee and a Distinguished Delegate award in the Human Rights Committee. The weekend was a massive success for all involved, in no small part due to the help of Mr Whitehorn and Mr Casemore, who gave up their weekends to take us to the event, putting up with talks of existentialism during the 2-hour coach journey to and from Hereford. The Vietnam delegation would like to sincerely thank them both for their support during the weekend as well as encourage any student interested in this event to jump at any future opportunities like this."

Particle Physics Masterclass



A group of Year 12 physics students were able to have the valuable opportunity to take park in a physics masterclass at Rutherford Appleton Laboratory (RAL) on Wednesday 8 March. The day included our students being able to benefit from lectures by world-leading particle physicists in the research group; a tour

of the X-ray synchrotron in Diamond Light Source; and a workshop where they analysed real data from the Large Hadron Collider, deducing the mass of mysterious particles hidden within the data.

Sam J (12S) who was part of the trip shared:



"The Particle Physics Masterclass was enjoyable and thoughtprovoking, and it was great being able to see and learn about Physics beyond our course. There were a variety of talks during the day, on a wide range of topics – we learnt about the Standard Model of Particle Physics and its limitations; the Large Hadron Collider (LHC) and how it manages data from its collisions; and the research done at RAL. It was great to learn more about modern physics research, and have some questions answered.

There were also a variety of tours and activities during the day – our group got to visit Diamond, the huge particle accelerator at RAL which accelerates electrons, and uses radiation from them in

imaging. It was so incredible to visit such a large, cutting-edge machine, and learn more about the engineering behind it. There was also an activity using Python coding to identify rare particles from real LHC data, and it was amazing how much you can learn from very little data. Overall, it was a very exciting and fascinating visit."

The Oxford University Computing Challenge



This annual challenge is an event which aims to encourage students who have achieved a top 10% score in the <u>UK Bebras Challenge</u> to further develop their skills and produce programmed solutions to computational thinking problems. Each year there are two rounds of the challenge, with the second, only inviting the top 20 students from each year group to compete.

Congratulations to Luke H (12W) for achieving the Elite National Finalist award of 6th place, James M (13C) for receiving the Elite National Finalist award of 6th place, Isaac Badipe (12L) for receiving the Elite National Finalist award of 22nd Place, Rujul Nayak (10S) for receiving the Senior National Finalist award of 6th Place and Maxwell Li (7W) for Junior National Finalist award of 9th place.

Perse Coding Competition 2023

The second round of the Perse coding challenge, which was open to the highest scoring entries in Round 1 only, was recently attempted by over fifty of the Reading School students. Round one took 40 minutes and was for pairs (or solo, if necessary) sharing one computer, whereas round two was for three pupils to participate together, with a maximum of two Years 10-11 allowed per team. Students sat together on up to three computers with up to three different logins per team.

This is one of the more dynamic and interactive type of competitions, with students sharing ideas and thoughts on how to solve the set challenges. Strategy was also key, where groups allocated questions to each other based on the varying levels of difficulty that suited specific students' abilities.

The key to success was to understanding the expectations of the online submission window, which took the code for each question and parsed it, providing an indication of whether the algorithm was successful or not. This type of competition certainly does require practice. Well done to all students for participating and we look for to more students joining the fun next year


