Whilst in the Refectory, the Boarding community, led by Matron Karen Andrews, enjoyed an excellent Charity Quiz. Friends of the Boarding community generously donated to the 2023 Boarding charities, namely Sure24, The Alzheimer's Society and Alexander Devine Children's Hospice. In addition, some of our musicians went directly to participate in the Thames Valley Air Ambulance Charity concert which took place at Kendrick School, following singing in the Evensong service in our Chapel. On Thursday, 30 March, our student-led 'own clothes' campaign to support women and children in Ukraine entered it's next phase with the departure of a generator and essential supplies to Ukraine via Poland. The delivery will be made by Luke H (12W) and his father, Mr K Holland and we wish them a safe journey and look forward to further updates. Thank you to all members of the Reading School Community who have supported this campaign.

Although the above events symbolise our commitment to community, charity, compassion and partnerships, they are by no means the only activities that we should celebrate. For example, the House Eisteddfod competition celebrated the cultural capital of our talented students. The speeches and dramatic extracts were performed by all Year groups with confidence, panache, style and substance. Mr Baldock, Head of English, our Prefects, Judges and all our talented performers are to be congratulated on ensuring that the event held in Chapel on Tuesday, 27 March was a successful celebration of the talent of our students. Indeed, I greatly enjoyed judging the Junior section of House Eisteddfod 2023.

In addition, academic excellence as illustrated by the 32 Year 13 British Biology Olympiad medal winners and sporting excellence evident in the British Schools Karting Championships corroborate the view that Reading School is characterised by an ambition to strive for high performance. Local and national success in musical festivals and competitions are also worthy of note. Furthermore, this week witnessed our first success at Futsal, thanks to our Year 10 team, ably coached by Year 12 students of PE, who used their knowledge of sports psychology to ensure trophy success, following a penalty shoot-out. Range and depth of opportunity characterise our approach, as illustrated by the plethora of opportunities to participate in the Summer Term in Electives for Years 7-10 inclusive (84 activities in Summer Term) and 39 co-curricular student-led clubs, musical ensembles and sports activities. Be active, be proactive, step outside of your comfort zone and engage in opportunities to thrive and flourish.

As we enter the Easter period, I hope that our Year 11 and Year 13 students are able to focus on undertaking extensive revision for their forthcoming GCSE and A Level external examination. Allergies

We would like to remind parents and students to be mindful in relation to allergies and what food students bring to school. Although we are not a 'nut free' school we would like to raise awareness of the impact that bringing nuts into school can have on students and staff who may have allergies. Packaged nuts, peanut butter, chocolate spreads containing nuts, cereal, granola, chocolate bars containing nuts, cakes or biscuits containing nuts. Peanut based sauces (like satay) and any food made with sesame seeds can cause severe allergic reactions for those affected by allergens. This list is not exhaustive.

Both children and adults with severe nut allergies can suffer from life-threatening reactions if they eat, smell, or touch any foods containing nuts. We are therefore grateful for your cooperation in helping to keep our pupils and staff safe.

Allergy UK is a nationwide charity for people living with an allergy and has resources for parents to access.

Internal End of Year Exams and Revision

We are pleased to provide students (and parents) with advance information on the internal end of year exams which will happen either side of May half term (for details, please refer to previous Bulletins and the School Website Calendar).

This includes 3 documents that we encourage all students/parents to print off:

- <u>a comprehensive guide to each subject's plans for end of year exams</u>, including how to revise for that subject in particular;
- the School's <u>evidence-based revision guide</u>, which provides a range of strategies for students to try (as well as
 details of ineffective techniques to avoid!);
- an <u>editable revision schedule template</u> with top tips on putting together a sustainable approach to revision that
 takes the stress out of it.

These exams are a celebration; an opportunity to demonstrate the fantastic progress they have made this year. *There should not be a reason for unhealthy levels of stress or study and we welcome and appreciate parents' support of this.*

They are a practice opportunity to experience sitting many exams in one go - working in silence, for extended periods of time, and having to organise their own study.

Students should explore different revision techniques and a variety of strategies, so that they are confident with effective revision ahead of Years 11/13.

There is nothing 'high stakes' about these exams, and we would caution students/parents against any sense of competition against peers. The exams do not count towards GCSEs nor A Level grades.

After the exams, teachers will provide insightful 'feedforward' - this is advice and tasks to move students on from where they currently are. These exams will only be useful if students fully act upon this advice.

Students should direct subject-specific questions to their teacher, and questions about their general approach to revision to their tutor.

Year 11 Study Leave

During study leave, students are welcome to be on school site if they would prefer. They will be asked to work in the LRC (quiet study), free classrooms (silent study) or the Refectory (group study).

Academic Excellence

British Biology Olympiad

Last week we featured and acknowledged Reading School Year 13 Biologists, who gained an impressive 8 Gold, 10 Silver and 14 bronze medals in the competition run by the Royal Society of Biology. Receiving a gold medal in this competition demonstrates that a student is one of the most talented young biologists in the country. This year over 10,000 students from over 700 schools competed with a gold medal being awarded to the top 5% of students, a silver medal to the top 15% and a bronze medal to the top 30%.

Sporting Excellence

British Schools Karting Championship (BSKC)



As featured in the February 3rd edition of the Headmaster's Bulletin, three students with the support of a parent and Head of Sport & PE, Mr S Allen, were entered into the BSKC competition. The nationwide indoor-karting championship is an exciting and rewarding opportunity for students that brings STEM to life, builds motivation and achievement, develops organisation, teamwork and management skills, along with increasing confidence.

Vinay V (11W), Mitansh N (11E) and Anuj A (11L) made it through to the local BSKC Local Finals Round and the Reading School cohort qualified 4th out of 13 teams entered. Parent, Mr K Vyakaranam was trackside and shared:

"All 3 drivers have had great moments on and off the track. Vinay bagged a crucial podium spot against some very experienced karters, nailing lap after lap and setting the pace for every race to follow. Anuj fought back through the pack with some brilliant overtakes after getting an unlucky randomised grid slot. Mitansh showed promising lap times, pressurising each driver as he too bagged solid points starting from the midfield.

I observed not only good teamwork and skill from our boys, but also spectacular sportsmanship, congratulating many drivers from their races and ending the evening on a high. Overall, it was a very pleasant end and they should be proud of representing Reading School so highly in their first ever motorsport championship."

Future Stories – Lent Term Update

Reading School's 'Future Stories' is a social mobility project, working in partnership with local primary schools and the community. This week marked the third of five after-school mentoring sessions run by our Future Stories team. The sessions run on-site at Reading School, focus on Maths and English to support KS2 learning of Year 5 pupils nominated to attend by their Future Stories partnership primary school. During the sessions, visiting Year 5 pupils work 1:1 with a Reading School Year 12 mentor.



These after-school mentoring sessions are organised and led by Reading School staff; Mrs C Heston, Mrs P Hickman, Ms J Postlethwaite and Mrs L Dimmick. Accompanied by talented Year 12 mentors Maulik A, Faiyaz A, Nicholaos A, Henry B, Ashran B, Arthur B, Rajan D, Yaman E, Fazly F, Benji F, Harold G, Thien H, Aslan H, Ashmaan K, James M, Dhian S and Vivek S, with Future Stories prefects Rishi D and Nirbhay K.

We were delighted to showcase the work we are doing on our Future Stories Outreach Projects with Mr A Anderson, Headteacher of Bourne Grammar School who visited us on Monday, 27 January. We continue to work with Grammar Schools across the country in assisting them with their own outreach work.

In addition, weekly Future Stories sessions in Maths mentoring and sports coaching, with pupils from Future Stories partnership primary schools have continued to run throughout the Lent term. These sessions are led by Mrs C Heston, Mrs Dimmick, Mr T Evans and Mr J Ginger, supported by gifted Year 11 and 12 mentors.

The Future Stories programme would not be possible without the time, enthusiasm, dedication and commitment of our staff and student teams.










Charity Earthquake Relief Concert

The sold-out concert featured artist Zeyno Durar, accompanied by her band who played a set entitled, 'Songs of Anatolia'. Zeyno Durar is from the South East region of Turkey which is a region impacted by the earthquake.

We spoke with San C (11S) who led on the event and he shared:

"They say a chain is as strong as its weakest link, but on Friday, we had no weakest link. Every single detail was planned and executed to perfection, and for that, all I have to say is thank you. Without the support and guidance from the Reading School staff team, this event would not have come to reality, or even got off of the ground. I was also supported by my friends who helped on the night as traffic control and without their help, the vehicles (some were of course late, the Turkish tradition!) were all parked and guests shown to Big School efficiently.





The event raised a significant amount and saw the wider community (the majority of who had not visited the school previously) come together for an evening of traditional Turkish food and music. 
