- The launch of Reading School's student-led Law Society for aspiring lawyers of all ages to learn about topics varying from UCAS admissions to work experience and what a career in law looks like
- The launch of Reading School's Motorsport Karting Team who will be entering the British Schools Karting Championship, led by Mr Allen, Ms Coates and parent Mr Vyakaranam
- The opening of a joint production of 'Chicago' led by Queen Anne School
- We have seen fixtures in basketball against JMA, Maiden Erleigh and Leighton Park led by Mr S Pedlow, a football tournament at the Oratory School and friendly Year 7 and Year 8 football fixtures with Blue Coat led by Mr S Allen supported by the whole PE department.
- Hockey has also made a comeback with a brilliant day of competition at Wellington College with our Year 9 team led by Mr A Robertson and House Ghost competitions have been taking place led by Mr D Tridgell

Certainly, generosity through time, expertise or financially is much appreciated and it enables us to provide a plethora of opportunities for your children to flourish now and in the future. #### Physics equipment campaign 2023

Practical Physics lessons enhance students' scientific knowledge whilst giving insight into methods and understanding scientific investigation and helping to develop their understanding of concepts in an engaging environment.

Did you know:

- An impressive **51%** of our Physics students gained **A\* grades at A Level** last year;
- A noteworthy 87% of our students achieved a grade 9-8 in GCSE Physics last year;
- 161 students selected to study Physics in sixth form; and
- We have an excellent record of students going on to study Physics related subjects at top Universities.





Last week, we saw the official opening of our refurbished Physics labs. In addition, we launched our Physics equipment campaign to ensure we are fully equipped to deliver classroom, enrichment and extension activities to all our students studying Physics, including our wider community, through our Future Stories programme.

To ensure our Physics Labs are equipped with equipment and crucial resources used for experiments throughout every year group, we invite you to support our campaign to raise £13,500 for equipment such as:

- Additional electric circuit components and cables
- · Boyle's law demonstration equipment
- Motor-generator demonstration device
- Jolly's Bulb sets
- Black out blinds

Since my personal appeal yesterday on Thursday 2 February, we have reached just over **£6,000 made by 136 donors**, with one very generous parent kindly contributing £1000. Thank you to every parent and OR who has contributed to this request as we have nearly reached the half way mark.

## **Key information**

#### **Behaviour reminders**

In wanting to maintain the safety and wellbeing of our students and remain proactive in keeping the school community informed, we want to remind parents and students about two points which feature in the <u>Reading School Behaviour</u> <u>Policy</u>, with the relevant sections duplicated below (in italics) for ease of reference.

Firstly, we want to highlight that we do not permit the buying or selling of unauthorised items in school. To this regard there have been cases of some students bringing in the Prime energy drink to school with the intention of selling it to other students. This is not permitted and we would ask parents to remind their child about this expectation. It is also worth noting that the Prime website states the drink is not recommended for children aged under 18. It contains 200mg of caffeine per 12 oz, which makes it stronger than Redbull and is equivalent to drinking 5 cups of coffee. Please can you support us to ensure our students do not bring energy drinks into school.

#### **Buying and Selling of Articles**

Students are not allowed to buy or sell articles on the school site – unless authorised as part of a whole school or charity event.

This rule is intended to anticipate difficulties of debt-collection and to eliminate opportunities for the sale of stolen articles. All staff are asked to be vigilant in this regard and to report offenders to Tutors or Heads of House."

Secondly, we are aware there has been an increase of reported cases of young people vaping in the Reading area. As a school we want to outline the school stance in relation to students which can be viewed in the extract of the Sanctions Framework below:

#### Behaviour

Students are not allowed to smoke or vape on the School site or when in uniform. Similarly, students must not have any smoking materials (which includes vaping pens) in their possession at School.

#### **Student Council Survey**



Reading School's Student Council is run by nominated Sixth Form prefects and each form group selects 1 or 2 representatives to attend meetings. A member of senior staff will also attend meetings to support the prefects, and if applicable, give some immediate feedback on the points which are raised. The chair shares relevant points with staff who could action change or consider possible solutions put forward. It is not supposed to be an opportunity to complain about things but a chance to share concerns and to try and find a solution. The Student Council also:

- Offers an opportunity for students to take on leadership roles, promote the voice of the student body, problem solve and impact the school community.
- Gives members the opportunity to foster skills such as leadership, communication, teamwork, organisation and public speaking.
- Report back to their form group and give them a chance to voice their views to be shared at meetings.

#### **Student Survey - Safeguarding**

Every month we share an online safety newsletter for parents and students and February's issue contains valuable information to be aware of which includes:

- PUBG (PlayerUnknown's Battlegrounds) an online multiplayer game with in game purchases, live chat
  and rated PEGI 16. There is a risk of inappropriate or offensive/violent language being heard or seen along
  with encouragement of drug use.
- HiPal a social media app rated 12+ on the App Store and Google Play. Hi Pal features a public 'square' where strangers can be messaged along with being able view other people's images and videos from around the world. There is a risk of viewing content that is not suitable or inappropriate.
- ChatGPT an Artificial Intelligence system that is currently free to access via a web browser. There is a risk, in terms of education, in students producing essays or answering homework questions which would fall under plagiarism.
