Introduction

We foster both the pursuit of excellence by our people of character and the sense of belonging to and engagement with Reading School, through the inspirational Belonging weeks. Belonging week enables our students to flourish so that we can help them to become, and keep becoming, the best version of themselves.

Belonging week is concerned with enabling a life of purpose.



Filling young people up with knowledge might help them pass examinations, and that is important as it provides a gateway to opportunities, including places at prestigious Universities. However, that is not necessarily going to help them to adapt and be resilient in tomorrow's world, so that they are equipped to deal with the things that come at them. They need to get the basics right in terms of their personal organisation. They need to be able to show up and communicate in person. They need to be sure of themselves, authentic in terms of who they are. They need to be able to look after themselves and then be able to look after other people. Certainly, we need to help them to become the best versions of themselves.

The groups we belong to have a big influence on our behaviour. In the recently published analysis of 'A journey into the psychology of belonging' by Michael Bond, the author emphasises that 'the feeling that we belong bestows its own

psychological gifts: companionship, increased self-esteem, a sense of purpose, a feeling of control and a moral compass.' Furthermore, belonging allows us to extend our spheres of concern beyond our own, individual wellbeing, to reach to a grander narrative for our lives, which includes sharing meaning with others.

How do we explicitly develop a culture in which all members of the Reading School community experience a sense of belonging through nurturing and trusting relationships? Through the House system, through our Floreat programme, Personal Development programmes and Belonging week.

How do we foster a culture of hope, through explicitly and intentionally ensuring students feel valued, safe, affirmed and autonomous? Through our strong safeguarding culture, House system, Boarding and approaches to pastoral care.

How do we create positive relationships built on psychological safety that provide opportunities for collaboration and flourishing? Through Belonging week and an ethos that emphasises opportunity, character and teamwork.

How do we strengthen an empowering environment that values and encourages educational growth, achievement and excellence for all? Through our focus on academic excellence, an ambitious curriculum, excellent governance, support from parents and the Reading Foundation and developing staff who are committed to Reading School.

Significantly, Belonging is not a comfortable but inessential luxury. It has potent, wide-ranging effects. If feeling excluded can be termed 'a social pain', we want to emphasise the far-reaching benefits of experiences of belonging. For instance, the raising of a sense of well-being and self-worth, improvements in performance and the lessening of defensiveness and hostility. A sense of belonging is arguably a condition of success, part of a 'secret sauce' in school, the workplace and home.

Being disconnected from our community and society can invite a discourse of despair rather than hope and ambition. This is why we have prioritised Academic Excellence, Belonging and Community during 2022-2023 and Culture, Character and Collaboration in the 2023-2024 draft Annual Operational Plan, currently being considered by the Governing Body.



We focus on the provision of 'wise interventions' that nurture belonging and self-worth. We prioritise situations that foster belonging that is a feeling that we are part of a larger group that values, respects and cares for us – and to which we feel we have something to contribute.

Belong literally means 'to go with', and a feeling of connection can decrease vulnerability. While at times our sense of belonging can be fragile, it can also be fostered. One of the most effective ways of fostering understanding and uniting people is to rally them around the pursuit of a common purpose. The process begins with the equipping of a "secret sauce" of aspiration, collaboration and a climate of inspiration, support and challenge. This climate empowers both the pursuit of excellence by young people of character and their sense of belonging to and engagement in a school that enables them to flourish.

Our emphasis on providing opportunities to flourish is evidenced by our Team of intrepid Year 12 philosophers, led by Mr B Miller and Mr T Casemore. They emerged victorious in the Ethics Cup, held at St Andrews University, Fife, Scotland on Thursday, 25 May. In addition, we are also proud to report of the success of Team Biohazard in being placed second nationally in the Our Echo Challenge, resulting in a prize of £2500, which they will use to address the issue of food waste in school. Character, teamwork, excellence and leadership are certainly to the fore this week, locally and nationally.

In 2022-2023 we have focused on the ABC – Academic Excellence, Belonging and Community. Undoubtedly, this week, perhaps more than any other, has exemplified our holistic approach to education, emphasising academic excellence through the internal and external examination process and character excellence through Belonging week.

In 2023-2024 we will prioritise Culture, Character and Collaboration. High performance behaviours are driven by culture. A values-based, purpose-driven culture is the foundation of our approach and sustained success. The emotional glue of our culture is our purpose of providing opportunities for our people to flourish. We know that our people seek a purpose, a cause that is greater and more enduring than themselves. We are adding to our cultural legacy through the provision of Belonging weeks that provide a myriad of opportunities for our students to be the best that they can possibly be.

We believe that sustained organisational success is the result of a long-term commitment to improving excellence. We know that the culture of an organisation is like an organism, continuously growing and changing. A positive culture is built on nurturing trust, developing people and driving high-performance behaviour. The word character comes from the Ancient Greek, Kharahter, meaning the mark that is left on a coin during its manufacture. Character is also the mark left on you by life, and the mark we leave on life. It is the impact we make, when we are here, the trace we leave once we have moved on. Indeed, character rises from our values, our purpose, our behaviours, standards and commitment.

Our people have ensured that the organisation of the internal examinations and external GCSE and A Level examinations have been effective this week. Thank you to the Examinations Team led by Mrs E Turner, the superb team of Invigilators and all staff involved in the complex, important processes. It is crucial that our students are afforded the opportunity to show what they know and can do.

In closing, the plethora of inspiring activities and evidence of 'Learn, Lead, Serve' could not have been possible without the leadership of Mr T Evans, Assistant Head and his superb team. Gratitude is about noticing and appreciating the positives in life. I would like to show my gratitude to all staff, students and parents who have supported Belonging week. Your contributions do not go unnoticed or unrecognised and we could not have arrived at where we are and what we have achieved without your active support.

Future Leaders & Sustainability Excellence



As shared with you on Friday 5 May, three Reading School students came together to share their inspiration, passion and drive to change the world as 'Team Bio Hazard' in the Our Echo Challenge, an International competition designed by educators to engage secondary school students in tackling the decline of biodiversity head-on. Maulik S (8L), Abhiram G (8L) and Naivedya P (8L) worked together on a project which focussed on recycling food waste while reducing CO2 emissions through the design of a waste disposal vehicle that transforms biomass into biogas.

In February 2023, a group of three passionate Reading School students entered the OurEcho International Competition, creating and advocating innovative solutions to tackle the growing dilemma of climate change and to increase the biodiversity within the school

and within their local community. Their proposals included creating a self–sustainable food waste disposal truck that would run on biofuel, recycling the vast quantities of food waste produced by the students using compost bins, aided by methanogen bacterium, and introducing vegetable patches around the school-site to grow its own organic vegetables. Team Bio Hazard came second place in the competition this week and have been awarded a cash grant of £2,500, which they will use to take their project further and make it into a reality.

Maulik S (8L) shared, "we are proud to have represented Reading School and Berkshire in this competition, and with the economic support we have received, we aspire to spread the impact of our project beyond our school and into the wider community."

Well done to all our students who have demonstrated desire and passion in wanting to make a positive difference.

The Ethics Cup



During January 2023, five of our Year 12 Philosophy A level students matched their wits against students from five other schools during The Ethics Cup 2023 at UWE Bristol. The tournament involved teams of students discussing current and diverse ethical issues and our team, Josha G (12C), Branson R (12S), Lucca K (12C), Jonathan H (12C) and Luca Z (12C) won the Ethics Cup regional stage with 2 wins and a draw against the schools they competed against. The team went onto progress to the finals at the University of St Andrews which took place yesterday.

We would like to announce that Reading School won the Ethics Cup 2023. The team competed in two debates of 45 minutes each per match with the day beginning at 7am and finishing well into the evening. The team spent over 3 months preparing for the final after winning the regional finals and we congratulate them on their dedication and hard work.

After speaking with Josha G, on his way to the airport to fly back to Heathrow, he shared on behalf of his team:

"I think I speak for everyone when I say that this was an invaluable experience. Coming from the regionals, we knew we had to up our game, and the standard was definitely much higher, but we had been preparing for months and that paid off in the end. We started with a tough match against a school that had previously won the competition, and that win fuelled our confidence, which allowed us to eventually progress through to the finals. This was the biggest match, tackling heartfelt issues regarding addiction and liver transplants. I don't think anything quite comes close to the suspense felt in the moments before the judges announced the winner, as it really could have gone any way! We are immensely grateful for the opportunity not only to engage in complex moral issues, but also to experience the character of a city which we may not have otherwise had the chance to visit."

We would also like to thank Geraldine Ng from the Department of Philosophy at the University of Reading for her support, Teacher of Philosophy & Theology, Mr T Casemore who led the trip along with Head of Theology & Philosophy, Mr B Miller.

InvestIn recently shared a synopsis of the World Economic Forum - Future of Jobs Report May 2023.

It is no secret that the rapid growth and development in technology is to shape the job market for years to come. Young people today are going to be faced with roles and processes that previously didn't exist, making for future prospects

that may feel overwhelming and exciting in equal measure. The 2023 Future of Jobs report from the World Economic Forum outlines the predicted trends and changes for the next five years, as well as the skills that are looking to be the most desirable to employers.

What are the predictions for the next five years?

It is looking like technology adoption will be the key driver of business transformation over the next five years. Over 85% of the organisations surveyed highlighted this increased adoption of new technologies. The three biggest factors in creating and destroying jobs are environmental, technological and economic trends. Big data, AI and cloud computing are looking more likely to be adopted by companies across all sectors; these, along with many other technological developments, are expected to be job creators.

What does this mean for the skills that employers are looking for?

Analytical thinking and creative thinking remain the most important skills for workers in 2023. Analytical thinking comes up repeatedly throughout the report as the core skill. The other 10 are as follows:

- Creative thinking
- Resilience, flexibility and agility
- Motivation and self-awareness
- Curiosity and lifelong learning
- Dependability and attention to detail
- Technological literacy
- · Empathy and active listening
- Leadership and social influence
- Quality control

It is the cognitive skills that seem to be growing in importance most rapidly, alongside technology literacy and self-efficacy. On the other hand, it seems to be reading, writing and mathematics that are declining in importance. Companies predict that 6/10 workers will require skills training before 2027, with analytical and creative thinking being the priority for this training. Click here to read more.
