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Introduction

The Reading way to human flourishing

The Reading Way is essentially about academics plus character. Intelligence plus character is our goal. We want all our students and staff to work hard and be kind. Our students are not cogs in a machine. We want to prepare our people for the challenges and opportunities of the Twenty First century. In an increasingly Al world, human characteristics need to be emphasised, including being compassionate, service-oriented, people-facing, resilient and agile. We are committed to enabling human flourishing. Crucially, the Reading Way illustrates that a rich curriculum full of character development should be viewed as a necessary component to prepare our young people for stability, agility and success. Reading School is a school for human flourishing and our people need to be compassionate and courageous, resilient and respectful, demonstrating intellect and integrity. Character needs to be woven in to the essence of our organisation so that positive impact is maximised.

We can shape a positive future story which emphasises academic and character excellence, character, culture and collaboration. Thus, the Annual Operational Plan 2023-2024, to be ratified by the Full Governing Body on Monday 10 July emphasises the 3 C's:

- **Character** focusing on character and values in order to enable human flourishing. The development in our people of habits of integrity, justice and courage enable the practise of humility, curiosity and gratitude. We build blocks of character through our 'Learn, Lead and Serve' approach.
- **Culture** focusing on a strong, positive, commitment culture that ensures our people act in the best interests of the organisation and are fulfilled within it. The culture of Reading School is only as good as the people who inhabit it. We support a commitment culture that is fair, sustainable and high performing doing the best we can, where we are, with what we have got. Culture shapes our organisational climate where healthy, high performance is championed. We support cultural architects.
- **Collaboration** focusing on enabling innovation and improvement. It is shaped by our community along with a myriad of local, national and international collaborations. We prioritise psychological safety, treating others with civility and success and being open to new ideas. Collaborative professionalism leads to big picture thinking for all What should we stop doing? What should we continue doing? What should we start doing?

Senior Prize Giving – The celebration of academic and character excellence

Undoubtedly academic excellence and character excellence was celebrated at the joyous event on Friday 30 June, held at the Great Hall, University of Reading. It was an opportunity to listen to the wisdom of the inspirational guest speaker Professor Parveen Yaqoob OBE and also to say thank you to parents, carers, associate staff and teachers who have supported our remarkable young people. We congratulated the class of 2023, and welcomed back our Year 14 ORs. Clearly, our students have played a key role in nurturing a purpose-driven culture and demonstrated leadership through service.

The Philip Mitchell Chemistry prize, James Economics prize, Brian Turnbull History prize, Bion STEM prize and Evans prize for Spanish were some of the examples of prizes awarded for academic excellence. In addition, we paid tribute to those students who represented the United Kingdom in International Olympiads. Whilst the Dr Rohma Newman Cummins Award for character, Joan Bristow outstanding commitment prize and the Toms prize for commitment to the Reading School community illustrate the importance we rightly give to putting our values in to action.

Mothers and Grandparents who inspire

The role of supportive parents cannot be overestimated. On Tuesday, 4 July we welcomed assessors from the City of Sanctuary organisation who were triangulating evidence from staff, students and parents regarding our commitment to making Reading School a place of safety and sanctuary.

Thank you to Mr K Luteijn for his superb leadership of our School of Sanctuary initiative. The role of family in supporting the education and development of our students was certainly evident in the highly successful Grandparents' Day held this week. Health and Fitness, metaphysics, earthquake preparations in Geography and much more was on offer. Thanks to our superb catering team too for providing meals throughout the day for our visitors. Gratitude is an important characteristic to demonstrate and I was therefore heartened to receive feedback from a number of grandparents of boys in Year 7.

Sporting High Performance

Not to be outdone, on Wednesday 5 July the Annual Reading School Sports Awards took place. Inspired by our partnership work with the True Athlete project, we honoured our students for sporting excellence and character excellence displayed in the sporting sphere. We celebrated elite performances and inspirational team performances. Indeed, the evening was a celebration of how our students and staff seek high performance, defined by Professor Damian Hughes as '*Doing the best you can, where you are, with what you have got.*' Significantly, with the full support of the Governing Body, we will improve our on-site facilities substantially, subject to planning permission.

In addition, from September 2024 the KSP (Kenwrick Sports Pathway) will be a new opportunity to flourish for up to 15 students in Year 7. The emphasis on developing a positive culture that places a value on commitment to maximising opportunity to flourish and also give back. We will work with Go Perform, Right to Dream and TAP as well as other local partners to build culture, character and collaboration through the joy of sport.

Ben Nevis to Big Ben (Via Reading School)

Are we running out of time? Sustainability requires positive action and we are very proud of being an integral part of a very special event today, Friday 7 July. Running out of time is the nation's largest sporting celebration of climate action and nature.

Miles for refugees 2023



We would like to congratulate Arnav A (11L) who recently took part in the British Red Cross charity campaign, <u>Miles for refugees</u>. The event was for participants who wanted to take on a challenge and, 'help give hope to people forced to leave their homes for safety' by running, walking or cycling a range of distances over 30 days. Arnav shared, "As I feel very passionately on the subject of refugees in the UK, knowing quite a few myself, after seeing the Reading School Refugee Week Art Exhibition, I felt the need to take action and contribute personally to the cause. To support this, I have pledged to cycle 22 miles for the British Red Cross."

22 miles is distance of the English Channel and Arnav not only completed 22 miles, he also exceeded his target of raising £150 (£180 raised in total). Arnav went onto share, "I hope that this has a positive effect on those seeking sanctuary, and that it reaches as many people as possible." Well done Arnav.

Alexander Devine Visit

This year, the Boarding Charity Committee has been working on supporting 3 charities, including Alexander Devine's Children's Hospice. On Monday 3rd July, some of our committee members had the opportunity to visit the Hospice in order to discover the inspiring work that their staff and volunteers undertake.

We discovered that, despite taking a substantial amount of burden off the NHS, the government only funded 17% of their annual operating fees. Additionally, we learnt that the current shortage of nursing and care staff within the UK has created a series of challenges for the Hospice. In spite of this, Alexander Devine provides exceptional care to over 150 children in the Berkshire area, caring for individuals with life-limiting or life-threatening conditions, both on site and within their homes, as well as supporting the families of those affected by these conditions.




Alexander Devine is a purpose-built children's hospice, designed with the sole focus of aiding the children and families for whom organisations such as this are a necessary part of life. Each of the rooms is outfitted with a hoist, allowing those with limited mobility to gain all the benefits provided by Alexander Devine. The children have access to a huge variety of activities, like a pool, gardens, a playground and a music room; the modifications that have had to be made to all of these facilities was a sobering reminder about how lucky the vast majority of us are to not need such adjustments.

Fiona Devine (the founder of the Hospice) intended for Alexander Devine to be 'a resting place on life's journey' for the children and families, designing it to be as welcoming and homely as possible.

Visiting Alexander Devine was a truly humbling experience, and all of us who were fortunate enough to see this incredible organisation were deeply touched by seeing everything that they do for the children and families. The Boarding Charity Committee are honoured that we have been able to support such an incredible organisation, one that is very close to the hearts of our members, and we hope that our efforts throughout the year to raise funds for them will help them to continue to serve as a beacon of hope for all those who need their services.


