Introduction

I believe that Reading School's 'secret sauce' isn't secret at all, and there are no unique ingredients. Instead, there is an unrelenting sense of moral purpose which is readily converted into ambition. Leaders, teachers, associate staff, governors and our students know that outstanding outcomes are only achievable long term, if people know the end to which they work. Clear purpose is therefore at the heart of our success.

Furthermore, academic outcomes are a necessary, but not sufficient measure of education. Rather, building people of character should be viewed as an essential mark of our authenticity. Focus on the nurture of character, deeply respectful relationships between staff and students, the value of autonomy and the significance of curiosity, enables Reading School to achieve remarkable academic success, without ever making this our exclusive focus. When compassion, integrity and authenticity are priorities, then excellence follows.

Certainly, our students develop positive attributes so that they grow through the 'Learn, Lead, Serve' journey, gradually finding more and more ways to use their own talents for the benefit of others. As an example, 102 Year 12 students mentor primary school boys and girls every week through our nationally renowned 'Future Stories' initiative. Thus, service for others isn't a 'thing' that we do, it is integral to what we are. This is exemplified by our collaboration with Ukrainian families, and leadership of after school programmes for refugees which have resulted in gaining "School of Sanctuary" status in 2023. It is also clear in the partnership with the Local Authority which has seen Reading School take on the role of "School Games" organiser to champion sporting participation and competition for primary schools. Further, as a regional Character Hub, it is evident that we are fully committed to supporting others to flourish with compassion.

Clarity of purpose makes us restless to do more. Thus, the September 2024 Year 7 cohort will include students on the new Sports Pathway, supported by the Chair of Governors, Mr Bob Kenwick. This will include initiatives of international renown including Right to Dream and the True Athlete Project. We seek to harness the power and potential of sport to nurture compassionate, self-aware and responsible young people. Through emphasising joy and fun, we seek to promote excellence at sport and also becoming exemplary family members, friends and citizens.

I would encourage all members of the Reading School community to fear less and be braver. A fear based approach is not the optimum way to achieve success. We should seek greater freedom from claustrophobic thoughts and emotions. There is no place for harmful cultures that masquerade as high performance environments. Can we seek to be braver? To perform with more freedom and joy, driven by the love of the endeavour and challenge? A fear based approach is not the optimum way to achieve success. We should seek greater freedom from claustrophobic thoughts and emotions. When we feel pressure and are anxious this can impact our wellbeing on a personal level.

Essentially, I want all staff, students and parents to know that Reading School will support you to be brave and to fear less. We all should seek to cultivate a compassionate inner-dialogue so that the voice inside our head resembles a good friend and supportive coach rather than a harsh critic. Fear of not being good enough can hold us back and can show up as jealousy, perfectionism or self-criticism according to Dr Pippa Grange, author of 'Fear Less.' Fear can be like a thief. But it is never too late to change our story.

Be brave and fear less.

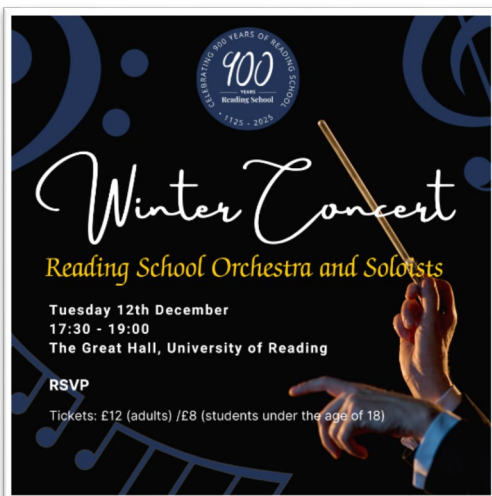

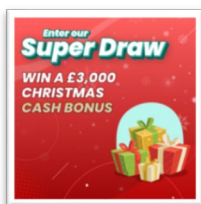

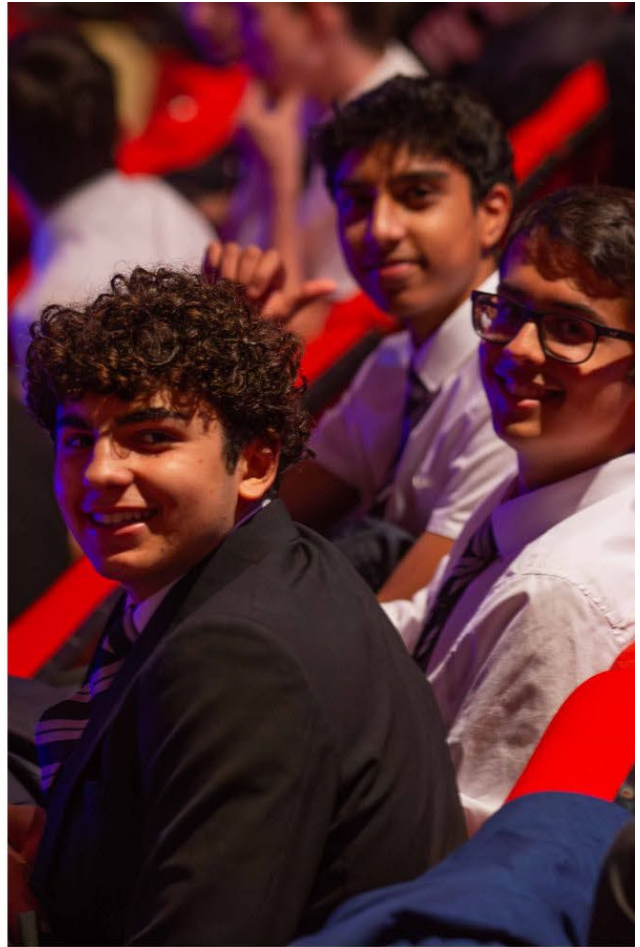

It provides a program of military-themed training and activities for students aged 12 to 18 and aims to develop qualities such as leadership, self-discipline, teamwork, and resilience, while also fostering a sense of responsibility and community service.

It's important to note that while the CCF has a military theme and offers experiences related to the armed forces, it is not a recruitment tool for the military. Participation is voluntary, and the focus is on personal development and citizenship rather than preparing individuals for military service.
