Our 11th annual Book Festival starts after half-term and here's what students can look forward to:


Scholastic Book Fair (21 - 26 February)

For every review submitted, they received an exclusive Hunger Games: The Ballad of Songbirds and Snakes pin badge. The series of books is always a favourite with Book Club, so this encouraged them to write 27 reviews.

These were then judged by Mrs Jackson and her two excellent Year 13 helpers, Ben S-R (13LDO)

and Tom S-R (13DAW). We had an overall winner, Thomas C (7S) with his review of Spark by M



G Leonard. Thomas received a Hunger Games film poster. We had two runners up, Joel A (9S) with his review of Rebel Skies by Ann Sei Lin and Arran T (8C) for his review of The Time Machine by H G Wells.

All students who took part enjoyed the experience and the whole project was student-led with the members deciding amongst themselves what they would like to display around the school, while taking responsibility for putting them up in within their Tutor Rooms.

Slavery, Power and Resistance

The Historical Association (HA) have been sponsoring six history lectures a year at Reading School for over 17 years and they feature lecturers who are respected academics attached to major British universities. They include many Oxbridge scholars and those from other renowned institutions. Among them, over the last six years, the HA have welcomed:

- Professor Tony Badger, Master of Clare College Cambridge, on 'How did Martin Luther King Jnr change America?'
- Dr Katrina Navickas, who had assisted in the making of the film Peterloo, speaking on the Peterloo Massacre of 1819 and its significance to British democracy
- Professor Jonathan Phillips, of Royal Holloway, University of London (and TV historian) spoke on 'The Life and Legend of the Sultan Saladin'
- Dr David Sutton, of the University of Reading, gave an account of 'The history of food from 1300 to 1800 Food for the Rich: Food for the Poor'
- Professor Peter Mandler of Gonville & Caius College, Cambridge and President of the Historical Association spoke about 'How Popular Demand (not Politicians) made Britain a Mass Education Society'

Professor Helena Hamerow of St Cross College, Oxford, spoke about 'The Origins of Wessex - recent Archaeological Perspectives'.

The History of the British Slave Trade in Eight Documents

The lecture will look at some of the key documents in the history of slavery, and the trade of nslaved persons, in the British Atlantic. From early Tudot traders to the uprisings of enslaved near and women in the nineteenth centruty, this talk will draw on government and corporate rehives to trace the development of the trade, how it manifested itself in Britain, West Africa and the Caribbean and explore what the records tell us about the experience of the enslaved and eir powerful acts of resistance.

In the current academic year, the HA have hosted Professor Natalia Nowakowska, of Somerville College Oxford on the subject of the Polish-Lithuanian Commonwealth of which Ukraine was a key part - providing some clue to the cultural distinctions between Ukraine and Russia.

In January, Professor Ben Jackson of University College, Oxford spoke on 'The History of Labour Governments'. This last lecture attracted an audience including eight local councillors including two of Reading's prospective parliamentary candidates for 2024.

The President of the Reading Branch of the HA, Mr Chris Sexton, welcomes all Reading School students to the lectures and he would like to thank Head of History, Mr D Whitehorn for his continued support. The next lecture, 'Slavery, Power and Resistance – The History of the British Slave Trade in Eight Documents' will be delivered by Dr Philippa Hellawell on **Friday 2 February 7:30pm – 9:00pm** (in the Lecture Theatre).

Badminton



Teacher of Mathematics, Mr S Pedlow has led and supported Reading School's Badminton Teams each term and both teams have demonstrated marked development over time. On Monday 22 January, a double header was played against The Webber Independent School (U14 and U16). Historically, the Webber teams have been of an exceptional standard, being connected to a badminton Academy and have several players at County level.

Mr Pedlow shared:

"The KS3 team were comfortable, even the No. 1 seed game, which was a very high standard. They won 6-0, showing poise and quality throughout. The KS4 team had a harder time. We had the best player, but Webber had the next best three. The singles went as expected; we won 1 and 4 singles easily and lost 2 and 3 similarly heavily. In the doubles, James S (11C) dominated, ably assisted by Nived N (10S). The 3 and 4 seeds, Neerav S (11L) and Sahil C (11L) started their doubles well, but lost narrowly. This left us tied, 3 games to 3. The first tiebreaker was on total points: tied 95 each!

To break the tie, the 3 and 4 seed doubles is replayed to just 5 points. Our team responded beautifully, winning 5-2. This puts us into the Semi-final of the VICTOR competition and we are already in the Regional round of the Badminton England competition, where we expect to face Webber again, amongst others."
