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Introduction

Dear parents, carers, colleagues and students,

The lunar calendar brings in the two-week festival marking the beginning of a new Lunar Year for those in China and communities living across the world, including staff and families at our school. It is a time for joy, celebration, reflection and renewal for those celebrating and for those born in the Year of the Dragon, it is said that they tend to be ambitious, confident and charismatic while possessing an abundance of energy and enthusiasm. Symbolism is abundant, with the colour red symbolising luck and prosperity, and various foods and decorations carrying specific meanings associated with wealth, longevity, and happiness. This time also embodies the values of family unity and the importance of community.

I share best wishes with those celebrating this year's festival and I also invite our whole community to consider that, historically, the concept of the dragon was closely associated with the emperor and imperial power. Emperors were often referred to as 'dragons' or 'sons of the dragon', honouring their divine or semi-divine status and their connection to power and authority. Belonging Week

Now an annual feature of student life at Reading School, all students in Years 7-10 take part in a week of activities and enrichment either side of May half-term. 'Belonging Weeks' have grown to become an important part of our school calendar over the last two years, during which time students have an amazing array of opportunities to take part in and which bring them together outside the classroom, to build relationships, take part in careful planned activities and to experience success as teams. All valuable life skills that will equip them to manage now and into the future.

Year 8 and Year 10 - Monday 20th May to Friday 24th May

Year 8 will be given the choice of three residentials this year taking place in: The Lake District, The Brecon Beacons and the South Coast.

The range of activities differ slightly at each location but all offer an exciting range of outdoor and indoor activities, along with team building opportunities.

Year 10 will contribute to and lead a series of community initiatives supporting our Future Stories program. Leadership is a key thread and the week is valued by students and partner schools alike.

Students in Years 8 and 10 will take their exams after the half-term break.

Years 7 and 9 - Monday 3rd June to Friday 7th June

Year 7 students will participate in a range of enrichment activities at school, around Reading and at local activity centres. This includes a camp-out on our school field while finishing the week with a House cricket tournament.

Year 9 will be given the choice of four activity programs in: Torbay, The Yorkshire Dales, along the River Thames and in Snowdonia. In all settings there is a genuine sense of adventure in wonderful settings. The Year 9 program builds on the Floreat Leadership curriculum and students have done much to prepare for this experience during Year 9.

Students in Years 7 and 9 will take their exams before half-term, from Monday 20th May.

Students in Year 12 also take exams before half-term, and then take part in work experience which they arrange in the months ahead.

Nearing the end of their role as Future Stories Prefects, Benji F (13MD) and Sam J (13DAW) have contributed the following reflection on how Reading School's social mobility programme, 'Future Stories', has flourished during their time at the school:

During our time at Reading School, our involvement in the Future Stories programme has done nothing but grow. From having never heard of it back in Year 7; all the way to our role as Future Stories prefects in Year 13. It's been fantastic to develop a deeper understanding of the purpose and impact of this programme, after taking the advantage of the many opportunities to contribute.

While Covid lockdowns may have disrupted some opportunities for our cohort, there has always been a willingness throughout the school community to help out. Moreover, remote online learning has created whole new mentoring opportunities. Some schools have enjoyed online Maths mentoring sessions – recently upgraded with drawing pads – despite not being able to visit us on site. The flexibility and innovation of the Future Stories programme has been particularly evident as it adapts to the post-covid landscape.

The programme has expanded its influence tremendously in recent years – Year 11s now have opportunities to take part where we did not, and partnerships have been forged with many more local primary schools. Involving year groups beyond just sixth form in the delivery of the programme has allowed us to expand the scope of the activities we provide, involve more primary schools, and thus support more pupils than ever before in many different ways.

Encompassing character education has been a particular goal, and we have seen immense success this year from more practical sessions such as sports, team building and problem solving. Academic support isn't the only thing we want to offer. You can get involved by helping with sport camps, team building and outdoor bush craft activities, and hands-on Science sessions.

In particular, personally we have really enjoyed helping visiting pupils to use a Trangia (cooking on a campfire), trying out chromatography or challenging themselves to problem solve. As Year 13s, we have both seen large changes over the past six years with the expansion of Floreat and character-building initiatives; we are confident the Future Stories programme is a significant factor in this change.

We hope that younger years consider contributing to the programme as a mentor as soon as they get the opportunity, as it is such a simple and easy way to give back. Being a mentor fits around your time at school, for example in sixth form free periods. In addition, there is minimal extra planning due to the incredible work of the Future Stories staff. There is no reason not to seize the opportunity when you can!

We both remember seeing pictures and displays about the Future Stories programme around the school, even when we had no idea what it was. We remember looking at the pictures of smiley Sixth Formers, patiently mentoring, and hoping we would have the opportunity to do the same. As we enter our last half-term as Future Stories prefects, we'd like to mention what a privilege it's been to be a small part of this fantastic programme.

But most of all, we would like to thank the countless staff and students who give up their time to take part – none of this would be possible without you.

Reading School's Careers Convention 2024 - Thank you



This year's Careers Convention marked a significant milestone, with five keynote speakers and over 60 diverse professionals in attendance, some who had travelled from different regions of the UK. The vibrant atmosphere in each area was a testament to the genuine enthusiasm of both students and professionals alike, creating an environment conducive to meaningful discussions and exploration of future opportunities. Students received valuable information about a wide range of careers opportunities, including the entry routes, training and apprenticeships. This year, we extended invitations to Year 9 to 13 students from The Abbey School and Kendrick School.

Our Careers Convention covered industries from Architecture and Engineering to Financial Services and

Healthcare, including <u>AWE</u>, <u>BDO LLP</u>; <u>Collectiv Food</u>; <u>Deloitte</u>, <u>Jacobs</u>, <u>Johnson Matthey</u>, <u>Kier Group</u>; <u>Royal Berkshire Hospital NHS</u>; and <u>National Grid</u>, to name a few. 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
