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Introduction

Dear Colleagues, Carers, Students and Parents,

Before the Easter holidays, Mr Robson described this time of year as "the business end of the season." Indeed, for our Year 11 and 13 students, this time of year may start to feel like the 'beginning of the end'. Most courses have moved into a phase of revision, students are given exam briefings to prepare them for their external assessments, and Modern Foreign Language speaking exams begin in earnest. Next week, House Captains will discover the results of the House Championship and the week after, school prefects will pass the baton onto to a new cohort of leaders.

For the 340 of our students in Year 11 and 13, the summer term is undoubtedly a significant period of transition. These students will sit more than 5000 external examination papers across 150 qualifications, with around 2100 A Level and GCSE exam entries in total. This process can be fraught with fear and apprehension, but it need not be, and I am eager to remind the whole community that this can be an incredibly exciting time.

Every Reading School student is a bundle of creativity and talent. Our teachers are passionate experts. Together, we are thoughtful, curious and diligent, and we ought to see exams as an opportunity to show the depth of our journey together, the breadth of our exploration and the accumulation of our understanding. Tests and assessments should not be seen as threatening clouds on the horizon, but as exciting thresholds into the future. They are not the purpose of our learning, nor even the best measure of our education. The purpose of our reading, writing and discussion is always to ready us for society, and the reason we sit assessments is to prove ourselves prepared for what comes next. I therefore invite all of our students to use the term ahead as a beginning and not an end at all.

The term ahead is a great chance for all of us to reflect on what we have discovered through the dark days of the winter. It can be an opportunity to reflect on what knowledge has 'stuck' and what has been forgotten. Ahead of us lies a gauge of our future direction and the chance to use what we have learned to 'feedforward', helping shape our future positively, purposefully and astutely. The summer can be a springboard. A stepping stone. A launch.

T.S. Eliot wrote: "To make an end is to make a beginning. The end is where to start from."

In this spirit, I would like to encourage all our students to embrace the adventures, and the assessments that lie ahead without trepidation. Our goal is not to achieve a perfect end to the year, but to create a stress-free beginning of the 'what next'. Equally, I also encourage all parents of students in Years 7-10 and 12 to pay close attention to the subject-specific revision guidance collated by Mr Fairchild, and to use these guides to reduce anxiety and stress.

My hope is that this term will be characterised by a rebuttal of unhealthy pressure, by balanced reactions to expectations, and by positive responses to adversity. It is surely not too high a bar to hope for a summer in which we are happy as well as tested, and safe as well as challenged. If, to appropriate Winston Churchill's words, "Now is not the end. It is not even the beginning of the end. But is, perhaps, the end of the beginning." May the summer term be a good beginning for all that lies ahead.

The specifics of the exam schedule will be released in due course, but a reminder that for Years 7, 9 and 12, these will take place w/c 20th May, and for Years 8 and 10, exams will take place w/c 3rd June, with those groups having their Belonging Week activities in the alternate week.


Azores Trip 2024

Geographical Innovation Challenge 2024

A challenge between 4 teams from Reading and Kendrick School who competed this week to present their ideas and solutions of how to tackle the real-world issue of microplastics and the harm they can cause in the environment.



Each team got to present their innovative designs aimed to reduce microplastics at source, or by removing them from the environment.



All teams demonstrated an understanding of the source of microplastics and how they find their way into the environment as well as their solutions which included justifications of funding, scalability, potential future modifications, stakeholder interests and awareness of the limitations of their solution.



All presentations were judged by a panel of judges and well done to the winning team from Kendrick School with their novel solution of using jellyfish mucus which acts like net to trap microplastics.
