There have been a series of incidents of Reading School students being approached by a particular individual on Craven Road. The description of the man is that he is around 40 years of age, of Eastern European origin, seems to always wear a distinctive orange vest and ripped clothes. When he approaches students he appears to be agitated and perhaps under the influence of drugs or alcohol. He has been trying to ask for money and to borrow students' phones. Students should be particularly vigilant in this area and keep their distance from him if at all possible. If students spot him, please come into school and report it to a member of staff as soon as possible.

Students should, wherever possible walk in at least pairs, so that students will have someone with them if this man does approach them.

Please be assured that a staff presence will be around the site at the end of the school day where possible.

#### Do you know anyone that could help by hosting a Ukrainian family?

We have been approached about a mum and son who are currently living in a very heavily shelled area of Ukraine. They are unable to continue living there anymore and would like to find a sponsor in the UK. They know people in the nearby area, hence they are looking for a sponsor local to Reading.

#### **Medical and Student Services Process**

Please find below an important update regarding our Medical and Student Services process.

Effective from Monday 29<sup>th</sup> April, we are implementing a new procedure for accessing Student Services. **The Sign in/Sign out iPad will now be situated in the Medical Centre**. We kindly request that all students use the iPad when entering and exiting the Medical Centre, just as you would with the usual Student Services room.

Furthermore, please note that there will no longer be a staff member stationed in the Student Services room. Should you have any questions or require assistance related to student services, we encourage you to visit the Medical Centre for this. If Miss Coates is not available in the medical room, please proceed to reception and ask for Miss Raval, who will be happy to assist you.

Lastly, please be aware that lost property will continue to be located in its usual area.

We believe that this adjustment will streamline our processes and enhance the efficiency of our services. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding during this transition period.

#### Sickness reminder

Unfortunately, there is a sickness bug going around - please remind your child to be sensible, safe and keep on top of washing hands.

#### Allergy notice for parents and students

We would like to remind parents and students to be mindful in relation to allergies and what food students bring to school. Both children and adults with severe nut allergies can suffer from life-threatening reactions if they eat, smell, or touch any foods containing nuts. We are therefore grateful for your cooperation in helping to keep our students and staff safe.

Although we are not a 'nut free' school we would like to raise awareness of the impact that bringing nuts into school can have on students and staff who may have allergies. Packaged nuts, peanut butter, chocolate spreads containing nuts, cereal, granola, chocolate bars containing nuts, cakes or biscuits containing nuts. Peanut based sauces (like satay) and any food made with sesame seeds can cause severe allergic reactions for those affected by allergens. This list is not exhaustive.

<u>Allergy UK</u> is a nationwide charity for people living with an allergy and has resources for parents to access further information.

### **Student Pencil Case Equipment**

Nikolaos, along with 3 other exceptional students, emerged as the cream of the crop from the rigorous British Biology Olympiad held at the University of Warwick. They showcased their expertise in micro pipetting, dissection, and bioinformatics to earn this prestigious opportunity.

The team of four will be flying out to Astana for the 35th edition of the International Biology Olympiad, where they'll go head-to-head with top students from 80+ countries. From Molecular Biology to Animal Anatomy, they'll tackle practical tasks and written exams!

Nikolaos said: "I'm honoured to represent the school at the IBO. This achievement is a testament to the support of my teachers, the rigor of the school's academic program, and my dedication to the study of biology. As I prepare to compete, I carry with me the aspirations of those who worked hard but did not qualify. Their efforts inspire me to make the most of this incredible opportunity to showcase what I've learned on the global stage."
